If you are now 66 . . . if you've been contributing to the Canada Pension Plan . . . and if you've retired from regular employment, contact your Canada Pension Plan Office now. If you will become 66 in 1969, get in touch with your Canada Pension Plan Office three months before your birthday. The people there will help you fill out the application form that

explain how your pension is worked out . . . and when you become eligible. You'll get all the answers to questions about your retirement pension. Payment is not automatic. You must apply to receive your pension benefits. Application should be made in the Canada Pension Plan Office serving your community.
