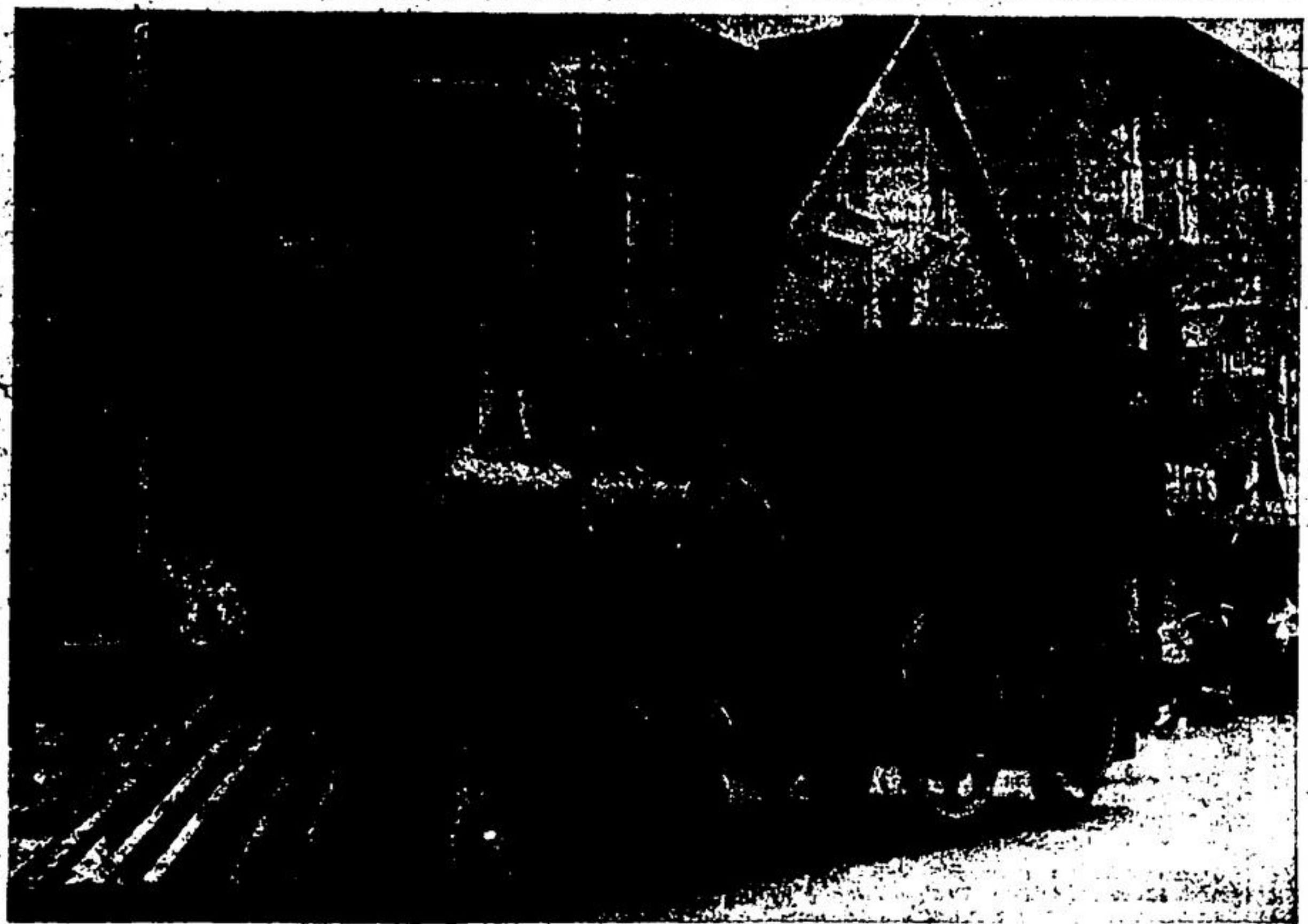
The float, with a giant hockey stick and puck, and the kids,

getown in the Grey Cup Parade." The train was built by the Georgetown Club in 1968, and was used in the 1967 Santa Claus parade, 1968 Brampton Flower Festival, and the 1968 Jaycees Spring Conference. It will be in Georgetown's Santa

Georgetown Junior Raiders are a new team this season, but the results were the same when they collided twice with arch-rivals, Milton Merchants on the weekend.

Georgetown went into the county town Friday night to face the league-leading Merchants with two members of their 1967-68 championship club and a bench full of rookies and blanked the Militias 3-0.

The rematch here Sunday enabled Georgetown to duplicate the victory and move into a first place tie with Milton and Lindsay with 15 points.

Stoddard was outstanding in the Raider goal and deserved his shutout in front of the Milton partisans Friday night. Neither team could dent the other's armour until well into the third period when Ray Inglis broke up the scoreless duel.

Larry Bradley created a 4-4 tie with less than a minute left.

in the middle period and Dwayne Hay and Brent McMullen scored their second goals of the game in the third period to gain the victory.

The other Raider goal was scored by Jack Kemshead.

Ted Hood scored twice for the Merchants while Rick Cole and Gary Naylor fired the others.

It was fairly clean game for the rivals. Raiders were slapped with 10 minor penalties while

Merchants picked up nine. The game's only fight was in the first period when Merchants' Ken Parton tangled with Larry Bradley and each received a major penalty.

Strong Georgetown checking in the final frame stalled the Merchant attack.

The next junior game here will be played Sunday afternoon with Richmond Hill providing the opposition.

Georgetown's C&V PeeWee hockey team are shaping up as one of the best PeeWee teams Georgetown has ever had, and the 1968-69 season could see them go all the way to the championship.

Thursday night the C&Vs defeated last year's Tri-County champions from Oakville by a score of 4-2 in the best game played this year.

Playing in Hespler Friday night the C&Vs came away with a 3-1 win. Dean Popiel was the big gun in this game with 2 goals while scoring leader Gary Nix netted one.

Brian Laird sparked in the Georgetown net, especially on a penalty shot which he hand-

led coolly by making the Hespler forward make the first move.

Sunday the team travelled to Brampton to take on the highly rated Etobicoke PeeWees and played them to a 2-1 tie. Tom Fendley was the best player in this game as he moved back to the point to take injured Rod Beaumont's spot.

The team has two fine goal tenders in Brian Laird and Al Densmore, either can step in and play a steady game. On defense Larry Petterson has been a strong point and continues to improve after a fine season last year. He has one of the hardest shots on the team.

Rod Beaumont, out temporar-

ily with a wrist injury, is also playing a hard hitting style this season, and can be moved to the forward line whenever necessary. Mike Forbes, a rookie this year, is improving at such a rate that he will be one of the top defencemen in the league by the end of the season.

Jim Davis has been a pleasant surprise. One of the team's best skaters, he can turn it on to catch opposing forwards on breakaway attempts. Tom Fendley is the other C&V defenceman. He is the team captain and the leader of the blueline brigade.
