NDP Quizzes A-G On Halton Crown

Experience makes a difference in the starting salaries of former crown attorneys, Attorney General Arthur Wishart pointed out this week.

He was replying to questions by Toronto NDP member, Dr. Morton Shulman who asked if Douglas Latimer had been appointed crown attorney for Halton County, what his salary was, what salary had been offered special crown prosecutor Ronald Thomas and why Thomas has not been offered the same salary as that offered Latimer.

Named Crown

Latimer was appointed Halton Crown Attorney November 21 effective December 15, Wishart said, and his position as president of the Halton County Progressive Conservative Association had nothing to do with it. Latimer was classified grade two and Thomas grade one because of a difference in experience, Wishart said. Latimer had seven years more experience at the bar than Thomas.

It was no reflection but simply a matter of experience, the attorney general emphasized.

Former Crown

A Georgetown lawyer, Latimer replaces former crown attorney Peter McWilliams who retired last spring to run in the June 25 federal election as candidate for Halton riding. He lost to Liberal Rud Whiting.

In the interim between McWilliams' retirement and Latimer's appointment, special prosecutor from the Attorney General's department Ronald Thomas handled crown duties for the county.

It was learned that Thomas was offered the job as crown attorney but he refused because the salary was too low.

SPORTS CAR ROLLS, OTHER HITS BRIDGE
