Norman Icam  
Prominent  
Presbyterian

A prominent member of the Union Presbyterian Church congregation, Norman Icam, 45 Queen Street died on November 21st in Georgetown hospital. Funeral service took place in the church on November 23rd, with Rev. Robert Duncanson conducting the service, and interment following in Glen Williams cemetery.

Mr. Icam had been a district resident since 1914 when his parents moved to Terra Cotta. Born in Middlesborough, Yorkshire, in 1902, he was the son of Charles and Kate (Bowler) Icam. They emigrated to Canada in 1913 and lived for a year at Trout Creek. He attended the old Clay Hill School.

He worked for Halton Brick Company, later was manager of Brampton Brick company for a few years and since 1951 had been bookkeeper for the W.H. Kenner & Son Fuel firm on Queen Street.

At Union Church he was an elder and a member of the board of managers, had sung in the choir and served as a Sunday School teacher and assistant superintendent and treasurer of the church school, and church treasurer.

He was a member of two Brampton masonic lodges, Ionic lodge, AF & AM and Peel Chapter, RAM. A versatile musician he played drums and piano in district orchestras, was a member of baseball and hockey teams in Terra Cotta, and was fond of hunting and fishing. He had been a member and a past president of Georgetown lawn bowling club.

He leaves his wife Edna McBride, whom he married in 1934 a brother Leslie of Terra Cotta and sisters, Mrs. W. Hayward (Edna) of Guelph, Mrs. Harvey Puckering (Elsie) of Terra Cotta and Mrs. Russell Kidd (Georgina) of Caledon.

Further to this, I would like to draw to your attention part XXXV Section 3501 of the Federal Income Tax Regulations which requires that all of the procedures that we have followed in this receipt writing process be undertaken in order that donations may be deductible by sponsors from their incomes for tax purposes.

David, Susan Most Popular In Names for Children

If your name is 'David' or 'Susan' you possess Ontario's most currently popular given name, reports Robert Welch, Ontario's Registrar General and Provincial Secretary. As prefixed double names, Joseph, Mary and Marie are most popular.

Perhaps not since Shakespeare first posed the question "What's in a Name?" has so much information been accumulated on Christian or given names by means of data processing. The tabulation of given names was a by-product of indexing birth records by the Office of the Registrar General, whose business it is to record all births, marriages and deaths in the Province.

The tabulation concerned names given to 75,881 children born in the province in 1964. Of the 75,881 boys born in that year, one out of every ten was named 'David', accounting for a total of 3831. 'Susan' was the name chosen for 1,863 girls out of 74,406 born that year, making the name the most popular chosen for baby girls, or for one out of every 45 girls. Ten most popular names chosen for boys and which accounted for a total of more than 24,000, were in order of popularity, and actual numbers, David (3,831), John (3,425), Robert (3,290), Michael (3,042), James (2,300), Paul (1,800), Mark (1,707), Richard

(1,706), William (1,636) and Kevin (1,346).

Baby girls or a total of 112,000 of them, were given the following names in order of popularity: Susan (1,863), Sandra (1,264), Lisa (1,162), Linda (1,118), Deborah (1,063), Patricia (1,067), Karen (1,016), Catherine (866), Christine (631) and Donna (591).

While the birth of boys exceeded by a slight 1,475 in numbers during 1964, the name tabulation indicates that parents use a much wider selection of names when it comes to a choice for their daughters.

Some names are popular for both sexes, such as Terry, chosen for 410 boys and 80 girls; Leslie, chosen for 118 boys and 294 girls and Kelly for 702 girls and 86 boys.

The remaining most popular names for boys — many denoting biblical usage — in order of choice were: Brian, Steven, Stephen, Daniel, Peter, Christopher, Jeffrey, Timothy, Kenneth, Donald, Donald, Thomas, Douglas, Scott, and Gregory.

The remaining 15 most popular names for girls in 1964 were: Brenda, Elizabeth, Kimberley, Barbara, Nancy, Heather, Kelly, Wendy, Cheryl, Sharon, Jennifer, Lori, Jacquelin, Laura and Carol.
