Acton took a tanning from Georgetown's Intermediate 'B' Raiders in the second game of a home series here Monday night. Georgetown cracked a 3-0 all game wide open with less than two minutes to go in the second period when they rifled home three quick goals.

The momentum carried over into the third period when the locals overwhelmed the Tanners 7-1 for a 13-4 conclusion.
