**Queen's Park Veto for Norval Traffic Lights**

Traffic signals at the townline and Highway 7 have been turned down by the Department of Highways, Esqueving council was informed Tuesday night.

Hand operated signals on the highway opposite Norval Presbyterian church were also rejected.

Norval residents had petitioned for the signals, claiming the school children faced unnecessary dangers in crossing the highway.

The Department of Highways instead, recommended a school crossing guard, and stricter enforcement of the parking regulations around the Hollywood Hotel.

Their survey, taken from seven different radar spots, revealed very few motorists actually doing the speed limit, it varied from 23% compliance to 98%.

Council decided they could do no more and decided to turn the letter over to the school board.

In reply to a council request for information on supplying Glen Williams with sewer and water service, the Ontario Water Resources Commission pointed out the logical method would be through the Georgetown sewage plant.

They asked for assurance Georgetown would accept wastes from outside the municipality.

The OWRC considered the water service to be much easier to inaugurate.

Building permits valued at \$285,060 were issued in the township during the month of November, according to the building inspector's report.

**Director Incensed, No Exploitation at HOPE**

Dear Sir:

I would like to clear the air so to speak of misrepresentation of the HOPE workshop. This, perhaps, some of your readers heard if they listened to Larry Solway's program "Speak Your Mind" Friday morning, November 15th.

One misinformed or deliberately malicious person gave a false account of our HOPE centre on the air, accusing us of exploitation.

As you know this service is, and has been for 2 1/2 years, a workshop for the adult retarded, sponsored by the North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded, a voluntary organization existing by very hard working members and public donations.

The director of HOPE has asked Larry Solway (who expressed the desire to come and investigate us to this unnamed person) to come and see for himself just what we are doing at the workshop. Anyone is welcome at all times to visit us.

Actually our contracts are "nuisance jobs" to the firms, but to us a start and a little less money to ask from our parent body, the North Halton Association, to continue to operate.

Just to see the trainees working on "real assembly lines" is a pleasure to behold. They are so happy to be with us and love to work.

**Churches Combine Forces Seek Parents, Children**

Dear Sir:

A number of Christian churches in Georgetown and district are combining in a drive to encourage participation in their work, and a group of laymen representing the churches are holding weekly planning meetings.

The Christian churches of Georgetown and district offer children a challenging program which provides a sound basis for examining and evaluating the Christian faith.

If yours is already a participating Christian family, this letter was not prepared for you, although we will be pleased to have your attention to its message.

If you are a parent who has been indifferent to Christian teaching — or if you have come to feel that the church is old fashioned, a non-vital institution that has nothing relevant to offer our twentieth century society, we challenge you to some thinking on the subject.

We are especially concerned that many parents do not even expose their children to Christianity, so they have no basis for deciding whether spiritual faith and its accompanying blessings of hope and sense of purpose can be sources of strength in meeting the increasing complexity of modern life.

We, who are experiencing such hope, would like the chance to communicate the basis of

our faith to all the people of our community. We especially invite young people to test our attitudes and beliefs.

There is not a single problem facing today's world that cannot be solved by an endeavor to do Christ's will. Problems facing our society are now of such magnitude that failure of the Christian church to establish love and genuine concern for others as a forceful motivation in the lives of more and more people will mean continuation of social injustices, increased violence, individual lawlessness, continuing racial strife, loss of human self-respect and eventual moral and political decay.

In North America, our preoccupation with the good life from our material and technological achievements, makes one uneasy and insecure in the face of the poverty, hunger and lack of educational and social opportunity in so many of the less fortunate countries. More and more the Christian church is recognizing its responsibility in bringing influence to bear on social injustices and to clarify the Christian viewpoint towards political, moral and social issues.

We need committed people in today's church, prepared to participate in debating and resolving Christian attitudes and promoting Christian solutions for today's problems.

If you, as a parent, think our world society will work out its problems without motivation of a responsibility based on faith in something greater than man himself, we would have to disagree strongly. If you do not accept this viewpoint yourself, we ask you to consider whether this question isn't important enough for your children to be able to ask it of themselves in the light of Christ's teachings.

We have 14 trainees at the workshop, 17 years to 50 years of age. They are being trained to do tasks which make them feel important and accepted in the community. Their pay is based on good behaviour, cleanliness and the ability to get along with each other.

Incidentally on January 1st, 1960 please note, our HOPE workshop will be known as ARC Industries, North Halton. This is to be in line with nation-wide A.R.C. Industries. A.R.C. stands for Adult Rehabilitation Centre.

Also on January 1st, the Sunshine School will belong entirely to the education authorities. But please do remember that these children grow up and come to the workshop which is still the responsibility of the Association. They still need your help and contributions to continue the operation of the workshop and to help to build a residence and maintain it. When the parents of these special people pass on, they have no home or people to care for them. Eventually, we hope that the government will take over these projects, but as of now these projects of ours are vitally important.

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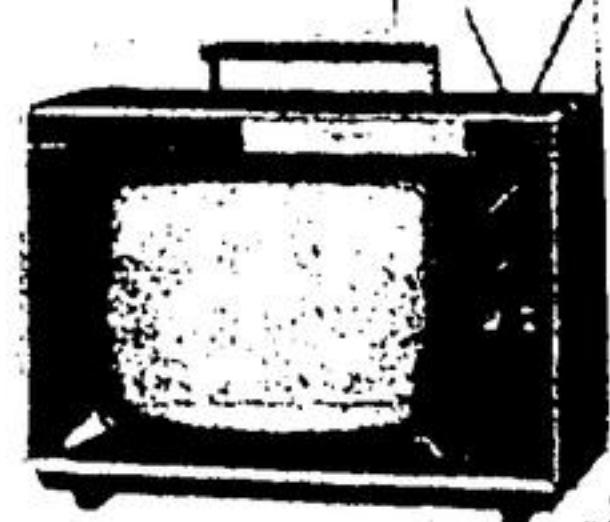

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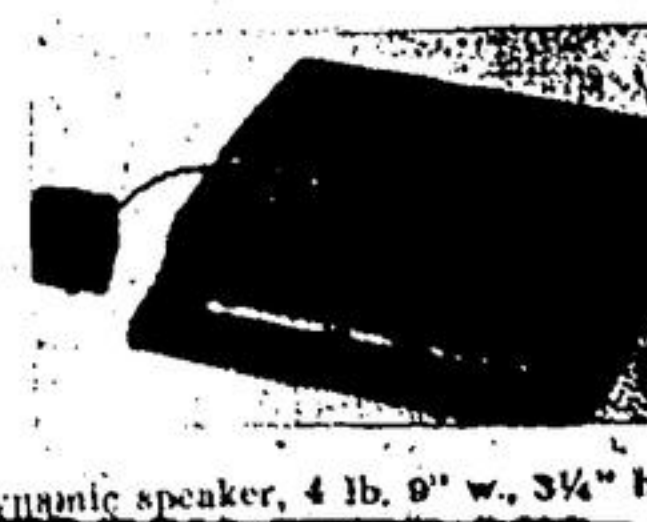
