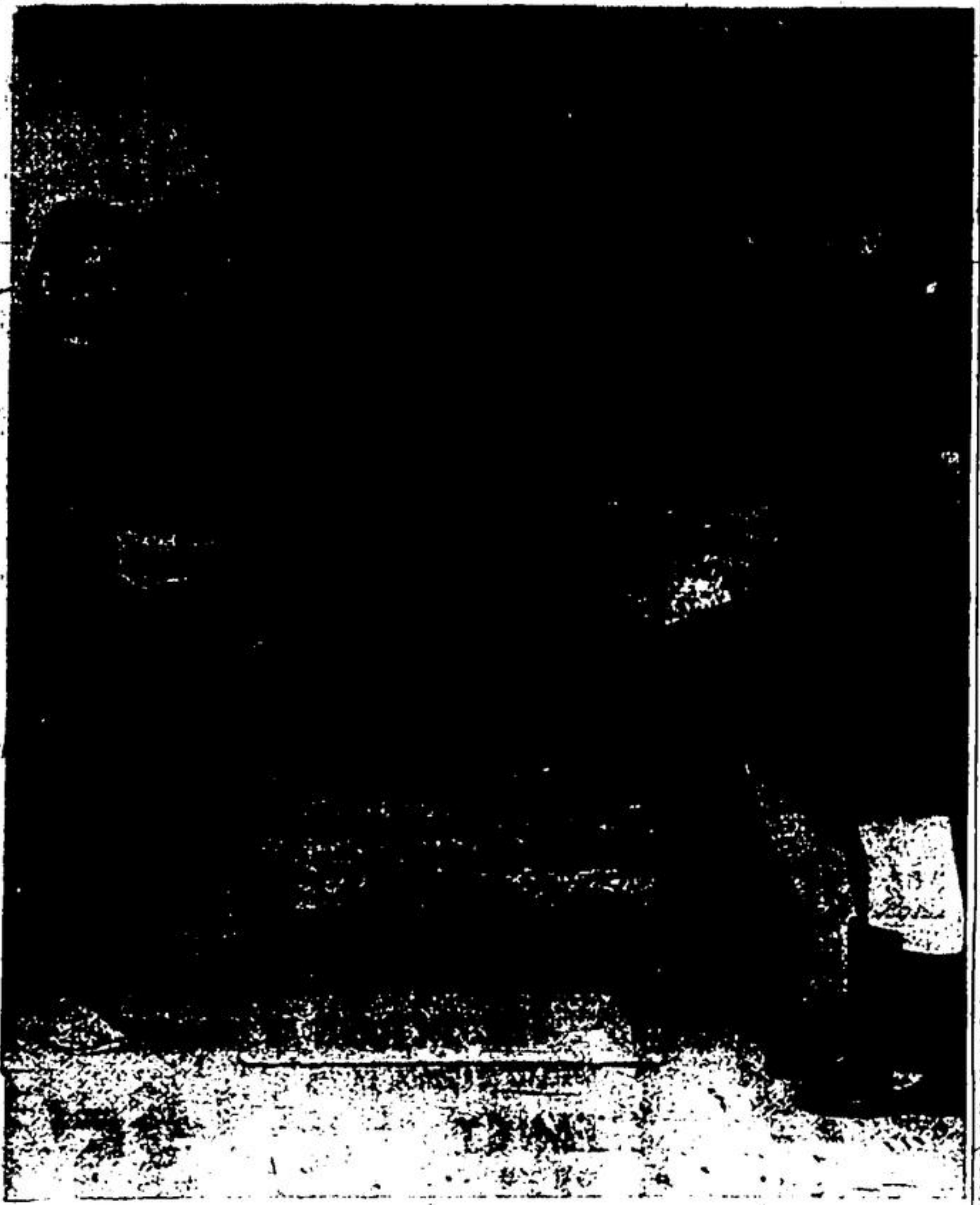


School Children's Gifts Going to Pelican Lake

An R.R. 1, Norval woman, workmen went too far. Mrs. R. J. Larner is more than a little disturbed about Bell Canada's policy concerning the cutting and trimming of trees. Several bushes were cut and an ash tree mutilated by a contractor hired by the company near the Larner home on Ninth line above Base Line Road two miles from Hornby.

When Mrs. Larner approached the contractor she received a very polite and apologetic refusal on her appeal to leave the bushes stand and not ruin the ash tree.

The ash tree stands near the lot line and even the low branches on the road side of the tree have been clipped — and they will never grow back, Mrs. Larner said. She does not mind the company clipping the branches which interfere with their wires, but claims the

Although she realizes there is nothing that can be done about the damaged trees now, she does hope to achieve some ruling or find some authority to halt any further damage.

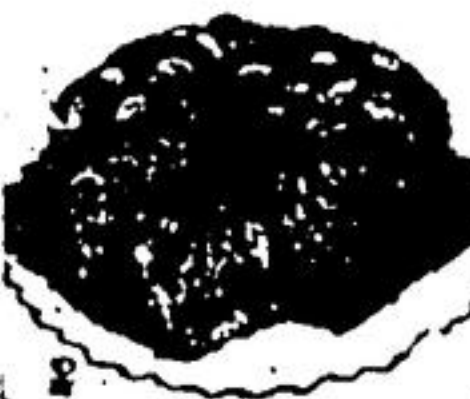
