## Two Goal Margin Disappears Raiders Drop Sunday Fixture

Five hundred customers watched a Georgetown Junior Raiders' 2-0 lead disappear as Newmarket came off a shaky start to thump the locals 7-2 in a Central Junior C game here Sunday afternoon.

Georgetown had a two goal advantage before the contest was six minutes old on the strength of tallies by Dwayne Hay and Bill Dwyer, but Newmarket drew the line there and overwhelmed their hosts from that point.

The first period ended in a 2-all tie, and Newmarket had a 5-3 edge at the end of the middle period.

The loss dropped Georgetown to third, four points off the pace being set by Lindsay, Milton and Newmarket. Ajax leads Raiders by a single point.

Nash and Kemshead aided Hay on the opening goal at 4:08 and McMullen and Bradley worked for Dwyer on the 2nd one at 5:26. Bob Kane scored both Newmarket goals in the period.

Ross Shropshire, Doug Widdifield and Mike Alcorn did the second period damage while Len Kay added a pair in the third.

Newmarket rained 42 shots on Raiders' Phil Stoddard while local snipers launched just 29 at the other net.

Hay's goal was his 7th and Dwyer's his 5th of the campaign.

It was Georgetown's second straight defeat, and their fifth of the season.

Thursday in Richmond Hill the locals also produced only two goals as they took a 5-2 setback.

Jerry Nash from Jack Kemshead and Dwayne Hay; and Kemshead from Larry Bradley were the only Raider combinations. Holden, Dunkley, Watson, Chapman and Harrington found chinks in goalie Stoddard's armour.

Stoddard stopped 28 shots, while Raiders fired 34 pucks, at John Brown's body in the Richmond Hill goal.

Georgetown will attempt to get back with the leaders this Sunday afternoon in Memorial Arena when they host Streetsville Derbies.
