Note Accident Increase in O.P.P. Weekly Report

During the week of December 1st to 7th inclusive, officers of the North Halton Detachment, OPP worked a total of 876 hours and patrolled 8,526 miles on area roads. A total of 32 charges were laid under the Highway Traffic Act, and 30 drivers were given warnings. In addition, 12 vehicles were given safety checks. Court proceedings resulted in 32 convictions being registered.

Forty one general occurrences were investigated, including five thefts, 1 break and enter, two disturbances; 1 missing person complaint which proved unfounded; 1 complaint under the Game and Fish Act; 1 trespassing complaint; 1 willful damage; 1 impaired driver was apprehended; 1 fraud investigation; 3 investigations under the Liquor Control Act resulting in four persons being charged; 1 premises was found insecure at night. All other occurrences were of a minor nature and required a minimum of time to clear.

During this week 13 accidents were investigated; five of which were personal injury accidents resulting in 8 persons being injured. The other 8 accidents were property damage only, and total property damage amounted to \$4,000. As a result of these accidents 3 charges were laid. Causes of accidents were — driver lost control of vehicle on icy roads; careless driving; failing to yield right-of-way; unsafe lane change; 1 hit and run driver; and driver lost control due to tire blow-out.

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Agricultural Pollution Must Be Farmer's Concern

Agricultural pollution has received considerable attention lately. Farmers in Halton must be concerned with this topic as the density of our county increases and as more people move out to the rural areas. In Canada, there are 5 people per square mile, whereas Halton averages some 450 people per square mile.

The increased use of pesticides and larger numbers of livestock on one farm has resulted in not only more pollution but more kinds of pollution.

The fact that a farmer has spent all his life in a community carries no weight if urban people move in and complain of air pollution. Perhaps the fan from the chicken house or the manure lagoon is near their home. Friction and complaints are not in keeping with the rural way of life. Thus, all farmers must become interested in pollution and try to keep it at a minimum.

However, the farmer can do much at very little cost. He can use common sense by burning

brush when there is a little wind, by spreading manure on a field and plowing it down immediately, by only building a large livestock enterprise in association with a large enough acreage of land for waste disposal, by not getting water for his weed sprayer in the creek, and by not having his cattle wading through the creek, etc.

Municipalities and regions also have responsibilities for wise planning for the proper use of the land and water. The breaking up of farms through out an area into small segments imposes intolerable conditions, not only in agriculture and social structure but on the pollution problem. Wise land use planning is required. It may not be too late for this, but time, especially in our area, is running out.

As Dr. Webber of the University of Guelph states when discussing pollution: "Each generation inherits the habitat that reflects the action of our forefathers. Thus, rational and responsible action is needed to control pollution."
