Dam Battle Over, Now Will Pipe in Water
The battle of Huttonville dam is over. Monday, council, and a delegation from Huttonville waited in vain for anyone to appear before them to confirm that the dam — destroyed on Aug. 6 — could be repaired for \$1,600. This was the figure quoted last week by Sidney Prue, one of the River Road residents whose water supply dropped after the dam's collapse. He said a contractor, who was working on the dam at the time of the collapse, had told the dam owner he could fix it for this amount. Offered \$600 Council, after hearing township engineer Ken Conyns suggest the offer was impracticable and impossible, said the township would pay up to \$600 of the cost if the contractor would give in writing a confirmation of the figure. But no contractor arrived, and Mr. Prue, last week violently opposed to the alternative solution, a pipeline decided his dam repair was a pipe-dream, as he said "O.K. let's get the water in by pipe." Rule on Permits Now all that remains before the saga of River Road and the dwindling water is complete, is for council to decide if it will grant permits to Jeroy Limited to build 10 homes on River Rd., so that the estimated \$37,000 cost of a pipeline will be reduced by \$18,000 — the offer made by Jeroy if they can build — and to apportion the exact cost of the rest of the bill to the existing residents of the road. If the permits can't be granted the entire \$37,000 will be apportioned among the residents. Prices will be given on a cash basis per home, or on a repayment basis over 20 years. Then, if the residents approve the pipeline will no longer be a pipe-dream and water will once more flow into River Road homes.
