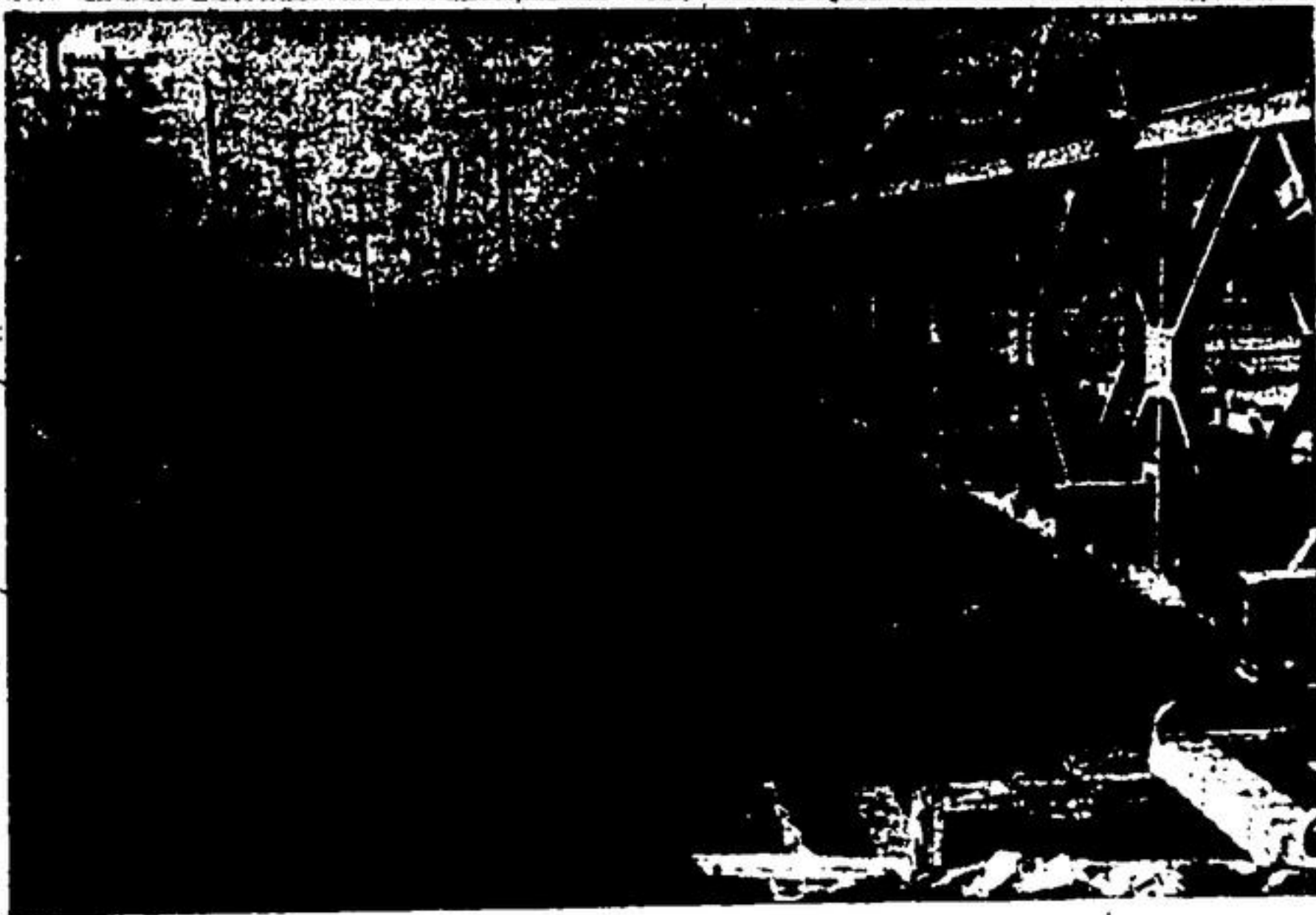
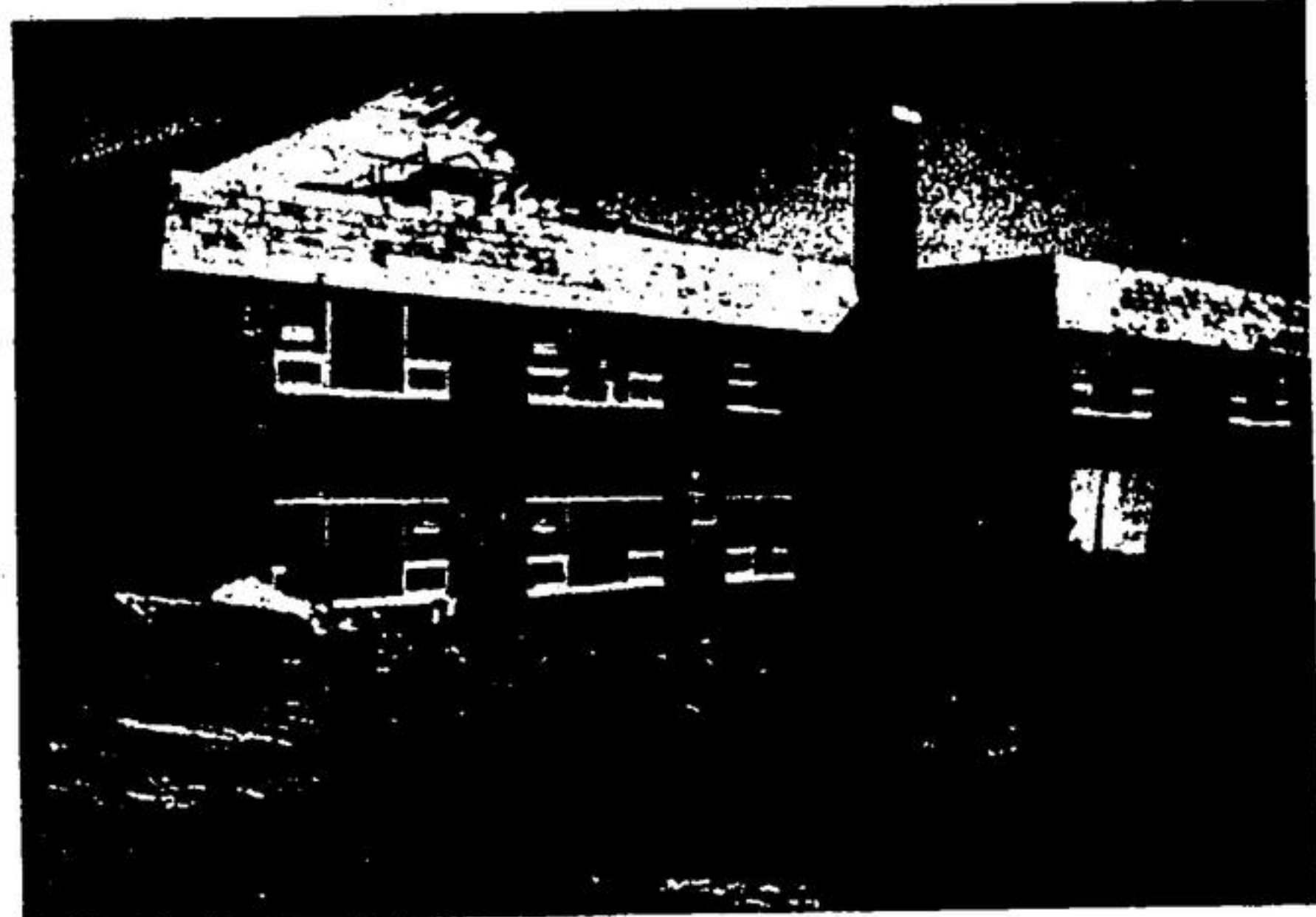


# FOCUS ON CONSTRUCTION

## Old Man Winter Can't Check Building



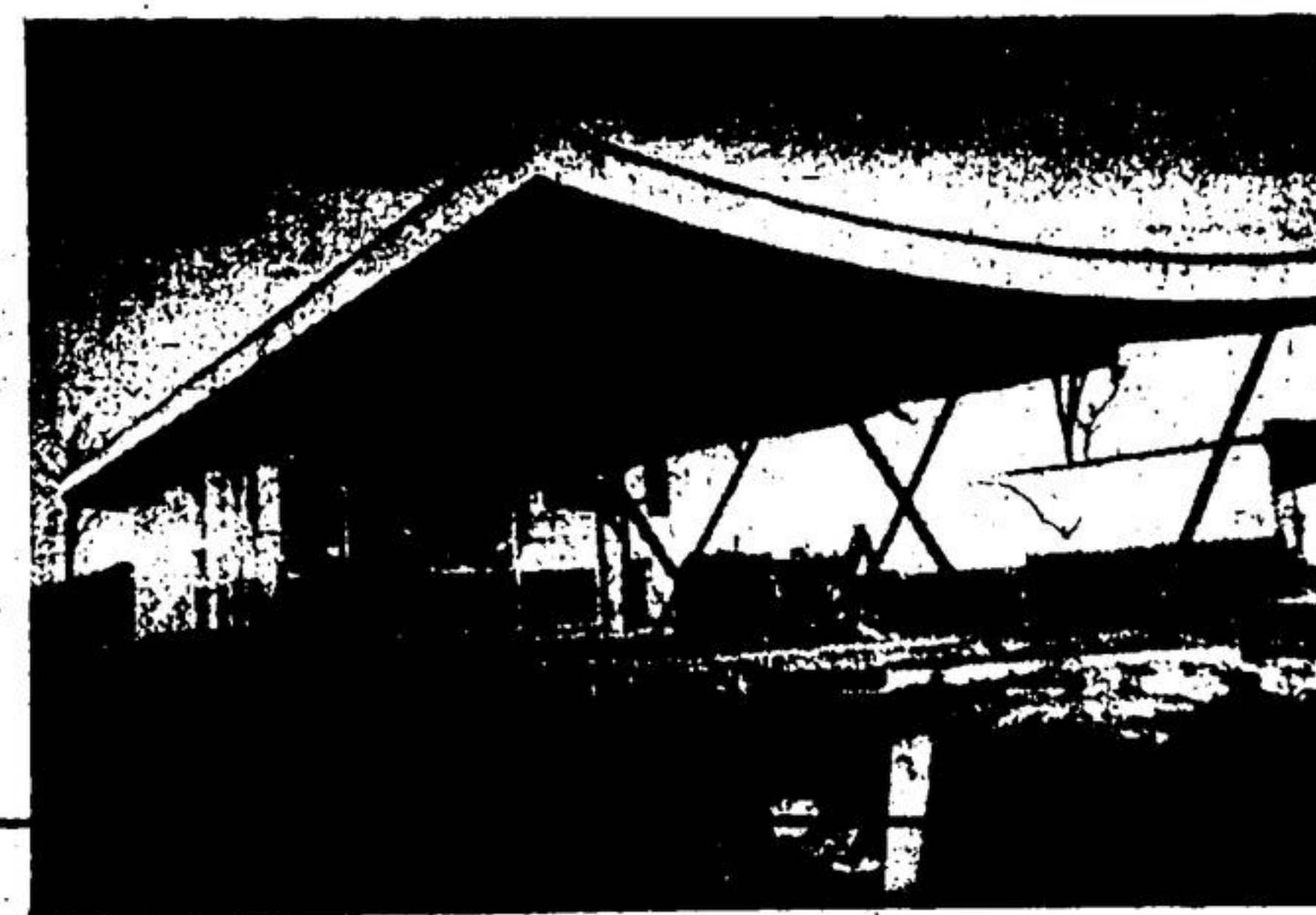
**MAIN STREET TRAFFIC** will soon be moving over this Bailey Bridge being assembled beside the Main Street north 'White Bridge.' The structure is a single lane affair with traffic lights at either end to control the vehicle flow. It is provided by the Department of Highways with the town paying only for the cost of assembling and dismantling and providing approaches, approximately \$8,000. The entire Main Street bridge project cost is \$390,000. The work is being done by Armstrong Brothers Construction.



**THE CONGREGATION** of Ashgrove and Hornby will soon be worshipping together under the roof of this new church being built on the 7th Line of Esquesing between Ashgrove and Hornby. The new church, Hillcrest United, is being built by Snow Construction. The two churches it replaces have been sold.



**GRAND BEACH HOUSING** is the firm building the A & P Supermarket at the corner of Sinclair Avenue and Guelph Street. The building permit was taken out in September and construction started about a month ago. Construction cost will be approximately \$120,000.

# 'Y' TALK

To give you some ideas of the changing YWYCA here are some of our goals revised. Increase involvement of youth in policy making groups of the associations and the national council. Your Georgetown Y has done this, already. There is youth on the Board of Directors and there will be more. Another goal is to extend the scope of the YMCA to work with more people and organizations in the community. One goal which the Y in town has already taken great strides forward is strengthening professional leadership. The Y has been so successful so sophisticated, so urbane, and so specialized that there is no place for youth anymore. Or is there?

Do you remember youth? You know — the funny shaped short people who have eyes on everything, feet that won't stay still, and hair that won't stay combed.

You remember the people who flop on furniture, drink bottles of coke with banana splits, soup up old cars, and never want to go to church on Sunday morning.

Maybe there aren't any young

people left in your area. Maybe all you notice is weirdly-dressed, foul mouthed, beer drinking rebels. Or maybe things are even worse than that — marijuana parties, glue-sniffing parties. If you think you can write your own ticket where youth has gone. Stop dreaming.

The truth is youth is still here. The YMCA is still here. The problem is getting the two together.

Youth is changing but so is the Y and the direction both are going cries out for more youth involvement.

Youth wants the tools to develop constructively doing things for themselves — the Y can give them these tools.

No longer do they want to be told how to do things. Youth wants to learn by doing, by being guided not by being told.

You the reader would by now be asking yourself, why did I go to such extremes and copy out in full this editorial? The reason is very simple: example. The Y in Georgetown has done just what Mr. Boyce has asked for. At a recent conference at York University, Georgetown Y was highly commended.

looked up to for example, Georgetown was one of the first to have youth on the Board of Directors, first to sponsor a youth organization such as Youth-In and also one of the first to be involved with problems facing the community in general.

In conclusion may I say, Georgetown, be proud of your Y organization, and give it your full support. For we are proud to be part of the growing town of Georgetown.

## Your Ontario Hospital Insurance would like to hear from you

(before it's too late)

When you are newlywed the "family" Hospital Insurance premium must be paid to cover husband and wife. If you belong to a group notify your group without delay or if you both pay premiums direct, notify H.I.R.B.

When you move to a new job you can keep insured by following the instructions on the Hospital Insurance "Certificate of Payment Form 104" that your present employer is required to give you on leaving.

When you turn 21 you are no longer covered by your parents' Hospital Insurance. You must take out individual membership within 30 days. Get your application form at a bank, or a hospital, or from H.I.R.B.

When you have a new address notify your group. If you don't belong to a group, write H.I.R.B.
