COUNCIL BRIEFS

Council okayed the purchase of fifty Christmas trees at \$2.50 each from the Kinamen. They will be used to decorate the town.

Twelve dollars a day is the cost of keeping a prisoner in county lock-up, council was informed, and they will be billed that amount for each prisoner next year.
