Milton mayor Brian Best rang in the new year last Wednesday night in more ways than one.

By ringing the town bell at midnight, mayor Best heralded the arrival of the New Year, but also signalled the doubling in size of his town, just as Georgetown exploded like a popcorn kernel in the mid-1960's.

An Ontario Municipal Board decision in June allowed Milton to chop land from Oakville and Esqueewing Township.

But Mayor Best, who hails the broadened borders, is quick to point out the victory will be a shallow one if Halton county goes to one-tiered regional government.

He noted that under a one-tiered system all county municipalities will lose their actual borders so that the long dragged out hearings into annexation of acreage from Oakville and Esqueewing will have been in vain.

"Under a two tiered system, and it looks as if provincial authorities favor this, nothing would change," says Best. "This way, all municipalities would retain both their borders and their characters so that our added assessment, and acreage will give us the advantages we hoped for."

The new Milton will be officially expanded by some 1,650 acres and about 100 people. Another \$1 million of assessment and nine miles of road will also join the town.

In both acreages annexed from Oakville and Esqueewing, the land is heavily wooded in industrial rather than residential assessment. Oakville will contribute some \$622,522 while Esqueewing hands over about \$330,000 in industrial-commercial assessment.

The town's present western boundary will be extended south along the railway tracks. The southern line will become Derry Road to jog south around the Milton and District Hospital property. Hwy. 401 forms the north boundary while on the east, the line travels up the Third Line to the Base Line where it jogs easterly to meet the intersection of Base Line and Hwy 401.

Already the town is experiencing growing pains.

As part of the expansion, the town has had to add two officers to its police force, here to police the extra population and road mileage. On order is a 5-ton truck equipped with a sanding unit and one wry plow with a wing plow along with another sanding unit for the existing truck.

The town now needs a 12 inch watermain on the Base Line from Martin St. to the Third Line, Oakville, from Base Line north to Third Line, Esqueewing, and west to the town limits.

Hotly contested at the Ontario Municipal Board, when the decision was announced in June that the annexation would be granted, Oakville mayor McLean Anderson described Milton as "a cancer on this town's backside."

When council later disassociated itself from Anderson's remark, the mayor explained that
