IN THE MAIL BAG

Explains Position on Channel Islands Milk

Dear Sir: I would appreciate space in your columns to say, referring to recent news reports, that the legal action taken by our Association is in no way an attempt to hamstring the work of the Ontario Milk Marketing Board. We hope that neither the public nor the government will misinterpret the motives of the Channel Islands Milk Producers in taking our case to court. It is not our aim to destroy the legislation. We are not obstructionists. We seek only the way to survive and live within the structure of the Marketing Board's milk pool.

Introduction of the government's Bill 17 to amend the Milk Act, 1965, results from the fact that in his decision in our case Mr. Justice Lief found that the Ontario Milk Marketing Board had technically exceeded its authority. The point is incidental to our argument that Jersey and Guernsey milk producers are in a special situation and require a special arrangement.

We welcome the government's decision to refer Bill 17 to the House Committee on Agriculture. We hope the hearings will provide opportunity for our group of hard working farmers to explain our ideas on how the milk pool regulations could be adjusted to provide the expanding supply of Jersey and Guernsey milk needed to meet the demands of the Ontario consumer.
