## Many New Features for Skiers at Glen Eden

The snow came down last week as the first skiers of the season at Glen Eden Ski Club in North Halton glided down the slopes.

However, even if there had been no snowfall the ski area was ready to open Sunday, Dec. 22nd with man-made snow.

Warner Dehmel, area superintendent for the Halton County Conservation Authority which operates the ski area, said the opening day crowd was about average considering the rough weather and poor conditions on the highways.

The ski area, located in the Kelso Conservation Area, will be open every day until January 6th when the schools reopen. After that the area will be open Saturdays, Sundays, Wednesday afternoons and Wednesday and Friday evenings.

Dehmel said in preparation for this season extensive alteration has been done to the main hill and extended snowmaking equipment has been obtained. He believes that these new features and others being planned for the future could turn Glen Eden into the main skiing centre in this area of the province. Dehmel hopes that a chair lift will be added next year.

At present Glen Eden has one T-bar and four rope tows to carry skiers to the top of the slopes.

In an effort to attract more skiers to the area, Glen Eden offers special package rates.

Registered ski clubs which come as a group receive a 20 per cent discount. Lower rates are also available to groups organized by any recreation department, YM-YWCA or other youth-serving organizations.

reservations. Many a time have I seen something made bigger so that it would be more efficient and cheaper to run. Usually, the opposite occurs. Expenses increase and efficiency decreases, because of sheer size.

Parkinson's Law takes over. Empire-building begins. Already hundreds of new administrative jobs have been created for the new system. Under it, board members will receive a stipend and no doubt expenses going out of office at the end of the year, and "couldn't make up their minds" about having something as old-fashioned as an 1875 school bell on the premises.

To me, it seems an excellent idea and I hope the new board will be receptive to the Colonels' idea. We talk a lot about Canadisma and preserving our heritage. Why sell it to the scrap-dealers?

This brings us to a roundabout way to the new school system in Ontario, which promises to be interesting. The old local school boards chosen in their own communities, are being scrapped and county boards elected have already replaced them.
