INAUGURAL DINNER

Speaker Gordon Alcott Looks Both Ways In Town's Time Tunnel

As a guest speaker at the mayor's inaugural dinner in Knox Church Hall Monday evening, Gordon Alcott did some tongue-in-cheek crystal ball gazing and even took a backward glance through the looking glass or Mirror as he would prefer it.

Mr. Alcott, a successful Syn Life Insurance representative, and personal friend of the mayor, is best known as the father of Little NHL Hockey which he originated in Georgetown in 1936, but made many other contributions to the town during his many years as a resident.

He now lives in Weston and recently bought a home in Erin.

One of his few unsuccessful ventures was the Georgetown Mirror, a weekly newspaper with a brief existence in the late 1940s which he made humorous reference to in his talk.

Jim Emmerson, a brother of the mayor and chief rewrite editor with the Toronto Telegram who introduced the speaker, said he remembers Mr. Alcott as his Sunday School teacher. Mr. Alcott at one time led the largest Bible Class in Canada.

Tucking his tongue well back in his cheek, Mr. Alcott peered 20 years hence and predicted: Georgetown's growth to city status absorbing all the fringe villages except Glen Williams, because ever since they learned Timothy Eaton got his start there they prefer to go it alone.

"Steamer has been in office for 20 years and I can see him arriving at Georgetown International Airport. Arthur Scott has built and donated a university to the town; a

Earlier in his talk Mr. Alcott did some reminiscing. "I remember Bill McDonald's delivery wagon and horse which wouldn't move on without a pat on the nose and a cube of sugar; the open air arena; the post office on Main St.; the old movie theatre in what is now the IOOF hall; the radial trains high school principal Ralph Ross who once on, chasing a flock of trunts from their hooky hideaway boomed after them, "The birds have flown but their names are known," sledding down Guelph Street hills all evening without being troubled by so much as a single car; sneaking into ball games, suffering attacks of honesty and sneaking out when the game was called because of rain; Perc Blackburn inspiring cheers at a Georgetown hockey match; a younger trumpet blowing Jack Armstrong playing at all the dances; boxing Sam Mackenzie at high school until both beaks ran red; and passing Mayor Emmerson's house when he was a boy and hearing last night's hockey broadcast coming through the open bedroom window a la Foster Hewitt."

In a serious vein, Mr. Alcott forecast progress by the town under Mayor Emmerson, and added a suggestion.

"The 50th anniversary of Georgetown's incorporation as a town will come about in 1972. I hope it is celebrated suitably," he urged.

He was thanked by Reeve Bill Hunter who presented Mrs. Alcott with a dozen roses.

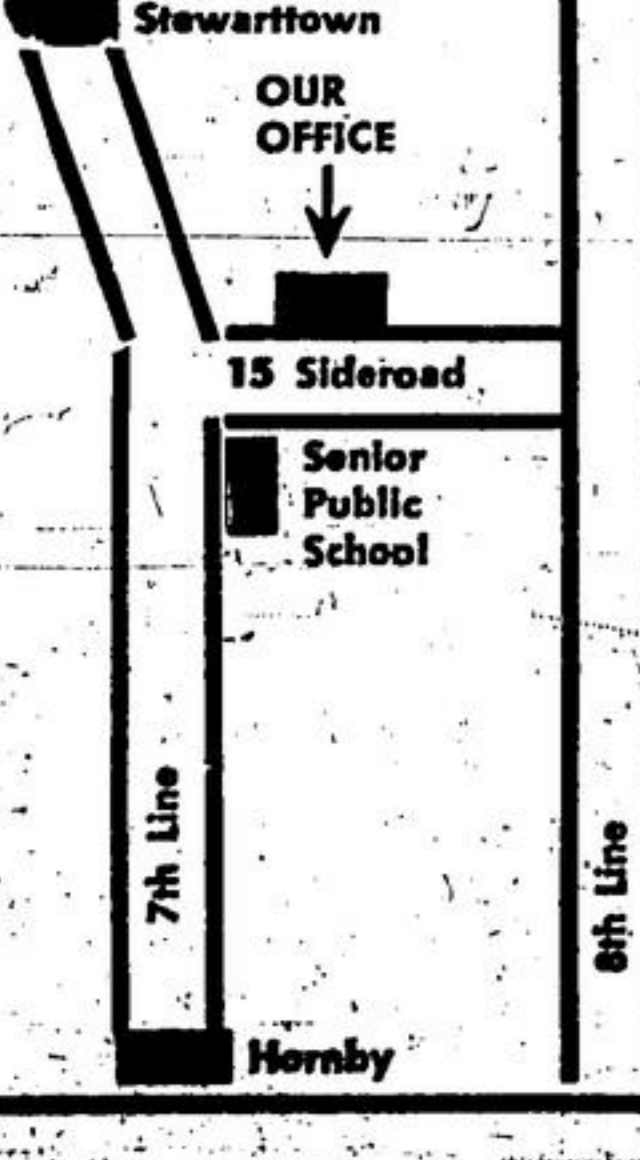
