NORTH HALTON O.P.P. WEEKLY REPORT

During the week of January 5-11 officers of the Ontario Provincial Police attached to North Halton Detachment worked a total of 1,013 1/2 hours, patrolling 9,418 miles of area Highways, County and Township roads. 20 charges were laid under the Highway Traffic Act and 27 warnings were issued for driving errors or faulty vehicle equipment.

Only 23 occurrences were reported during this time period, including 2 theft investigations, 1 fraud complaint and 1 assault. All other occurrences were of a minor nature and required a minimum of time to clear. Many of these involved abandoned vehicles.

Officers were kept busy investigating 14 motor vehicle accidents this week, only 1 of which resulted in injury to 1 person. Charges were laid against 2 drivers as a result of the accidents. Major causes of the mishaps were driver losing control of vehicle on icy roads, improper passing, following too closely, 2 were caused when dogs ran onto the road, and 1 accident was a hit and run. Total property damage was estimated at \$5,770.
