

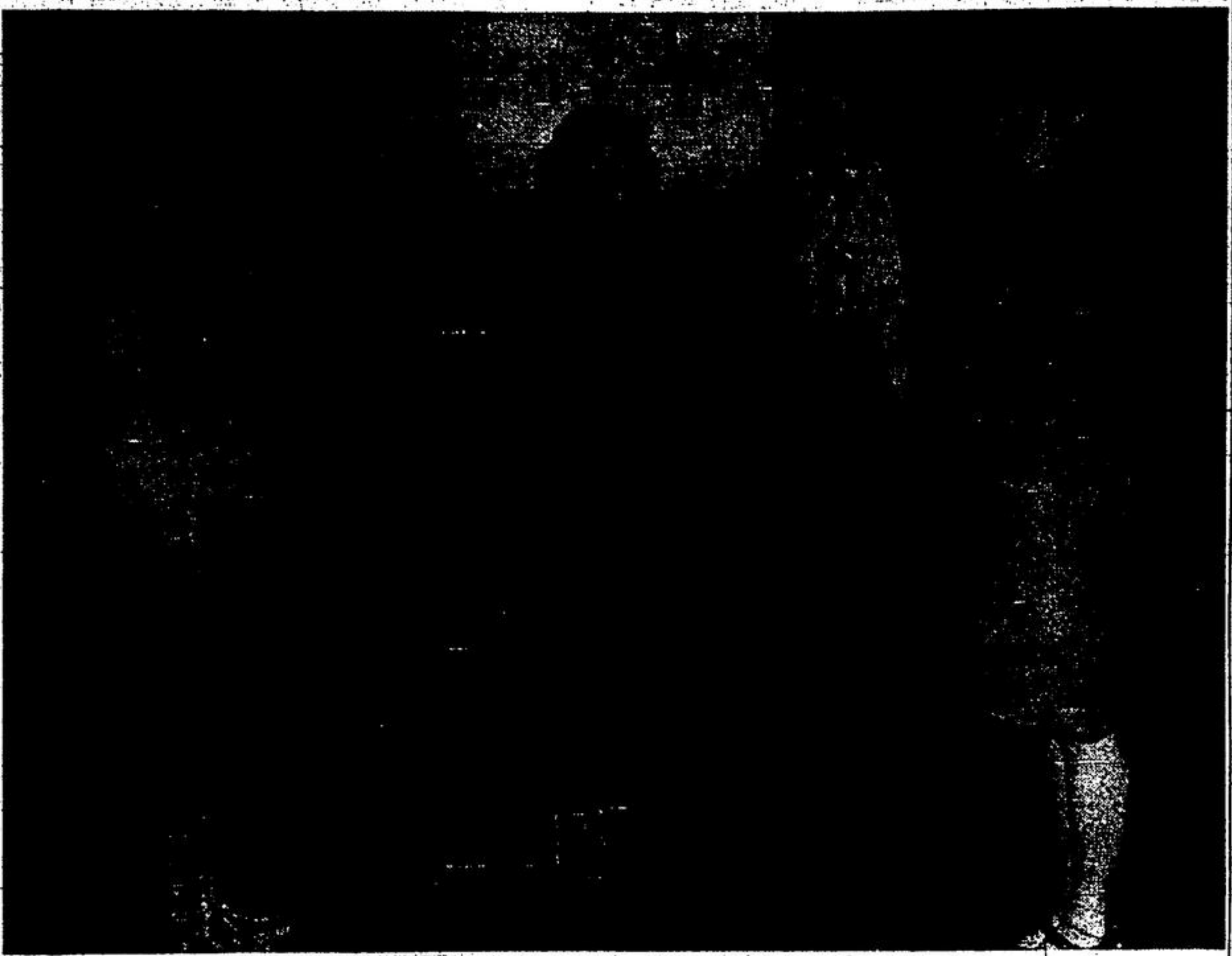
Pearce Porter Rink Hepburn Trophy Winner

After 25 Suburban Junior C League games, Georgetown Raiders are batting .500 and share sixth place with Bowmanville.

A four goal performance by Graham Horn sparked Milton Merchants Sunday as they tagged Georgetown with a 9-3 defeat in the Memorial Arena — their tenth of the season. Raiders also have ten wins and five draws.

Milton's win was their 18th against just five losses and 3 ties.

Rick Cole, Steve Lawrence, Don Hearn, Marty Seeds and Paul Kitchener were the other marksmen for the winners — while Bill Dwyer, Jack Kemshead and Brad Johnson shared the locals' scoring.

Raiders drew first blood as Dwyer scored from Larry Bradley at the 1:25 mark of the opening period, but Hearn put the visitors on the board at 14:06, scoring from Basteed.

Milton did all the second period scoring starting with Hearn's goal from Rick Cole at 5:1 seconds. Lawrence, unassisted, made it 3-1 at 8:24, and then Hearn struck twice more from

Raiders appeared headed for a spectacular finish as Kemshead notched his goal from Ray Inglis, and Johnson scored from Dwyer in the first three minutes of the period, but the rally stopped at 5-3.

Although Merchants picked up 17 of the 38 minor penalties whistled in the game, Raiders managed to make their power play produce just once. The Merchants' power play was a little more effective as they potted three goals while enjoying an edge in manpower.

Georgetown's Bill Dwyer picked up the game's only major penalty for butt ending in the first period.

law which will keep him out of action for six weeks. In Bowmanville last Wednesday, Raiders also lost Glen Chapman for the same period after a broken arm when losing 5-3.

Spot 28 Species of Birds In Nature Club Census

Georgetown and District Naturalists' Club held a bird census on Saturday, Dec. 28. The study area was a circular region of seven and a half mile radius, with its centre, George-Lawn.

Due to the relatively small membership of the club and the heavy snowfall and freezing rain, making driving almost impossible, the area was not well covered by observers. Unfortunately the entire region west of Georgetown, including Limehouse, was neglected. However, the heavy snowfall had a positive advantage to feeder watchers. Birds were attracted to home feeders in greater numbers than usual because the wild natural food was covered.
