A skeleton crew of Georgetown Intermediate Raiders raised 65 shots on the Ferguson Thistles' goal Friday night during a one-sided Intermediate B tilt that produced a 13-3 verdict.

Inglis could devote full attention to his blue-line duty.

Kent Robinson cracked an ankle in the same game, and another rearguard Wayne Davison is also limping.

Mr. and Mrs. R. Worthy, Ewing Street, are one local couple watching the progress of the Oakland Seals of the National Hockey League with more than a little interest. The reason for their daily attention to the Seals' fate in the newspaper sports columns is a goalie with the same last name.

He's their son Chris who made the jump to the NHL from Flin Flon of the Western Canadian Junior Hockey League

in November.

Worthy, who played his minor hockey in Don Mills, played Junior B with Hamilton and Goderich before going to Flin Flon for three years.

Oakland acquired the rights to the six foot, 180 pound goalie in a trade with Detroit Red Wings at the end of last season.

Worthy attracted a lot of attention recently when he was sent in to replace Gary Smith

and foiled Chico Maki on a penalty shot try in a game between Oakland and Chicago Black Hawks.

The Oakland Seals' program, which was puffed before Worthy was brought up, calls him one of the Seals' best amateur prospects.

Last year in Flin Flon he had a goals against average of 2.39 in 54 games while ringing up 10 shutouts.

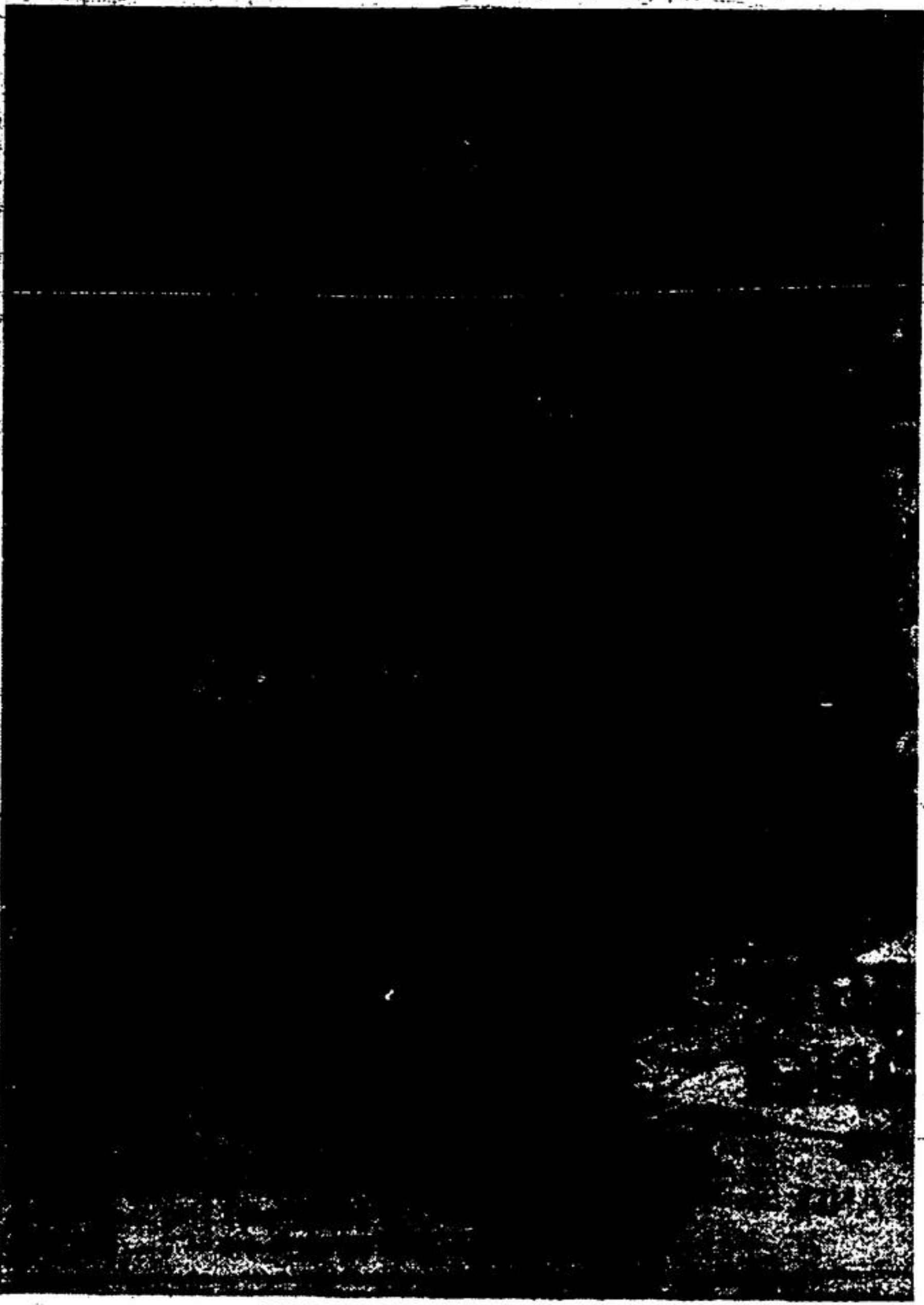
