Expect U.S. Imports to Reduce Drug Costs Here Lost in Flash Fire Sunday

Commons' committee which probed drug costs in Canada is pleased that lower priced prescription drugs may soon be av-

Dr. Harry Harley, retired Halton riding MP was commenting on reports that the drugs bill is high on the list of priorities to be discussed in the Commons.

The bill is designed to cut prices by injecting more competition into the manufacturing of drugs.

It is now over two and one half years since the committee began its probe into the high cost of drugs. Harley said he spent enough time in Ottawa to realize that it takes time for things to happen.

Held Study

Following a year of study into the costs, in which the committee heard fact and opinion from doctors, scientists, manufacturers, druggists, and on the major ones. civil servants, the report was released. One of its recommendations, that sales tax on drugs be removed, was implemented by then Finance Minister Mitchell Sharp.
