### Georgetown's New Chief Fire Prevention Chairman

Jack Cunningham, newly-elected chief of the Georgetown fire department, was named chairman of Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau for 1969, at the bureau's annual meeting in Milton. Chief Cunningham was vice chairman of the bureau last year, and has been an active member for years.

Vice chairman is Chief M. Holmes of the Acton Fire Department. Two Burlington firefighters, Rick Burgin and Paul MacNeil, will serve this year as secretary and treasurer.

Highlights of 1968 included distribution of 10,000 spring clean-up posters and 25,000 fire prevention place mats, the annual fire prevention week programs and church parades, Halloween and Christmas fire safety programs, the annual children's poster competition, and a large scrapbook of bureau activities which won a prize in the National Fire Protection Association competition, the outgoing chairman reported.

Retiring chairman Jim Coulson of Milton reviewed the 1968 work of the Bureau, before turning over the gavel to the new chairman. He praised the members for their co-operation and thanked Halton County council for its annual grant.

The publicity committee is working on a new float which could promote fire safety in various parades around the county. Several interesting meetings are planned for 1969 and a representative of the Canadian Fireworks Manufacturers Association has been invited to speak at a meeting in the near future.

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## NOTICE OF ELECTRIC RATE ADJUSTMENT

Announcement of an adjustment in Electrical Energy Rates appeared in the December 24th and December 31st issues of The Georgetown Herald.

Effective with all bills issued on and after March 1st, 1969, the following rates will apply:

### SCHEDULE APPLICABLE TO GEORGETOWN

#### RESIDENTIAL RATE

First 50 K.W.H. per month ..... 3.8c per K.W.H.  
Next 200 K.W.H. per month ..... 1.6c per K.W.H.  
1.0c per K.W.H. for all additional monthly consumption.

#### Metered Water Heating

A block of 500 K.W.H. per month at a special rate of 0.7c per K.W.H. uncontrolled and 0.5c per K.W.H. controlled is available to customers using an approved electric water heater supplied through the Residential service meter after 250 K.W.H.'s per month have been billed at the foregoing rates.

#### All-electric Rate

All energy sold to residential customers using all electric house heating and water heating supplied through the residential service meter, and where electricity is the sole source of energy in the residence to be charged at a rate of 1.0c per K.W.H. for all monthly consumption.

Minimum Monthly Bill — \$2.50.

#### GENERAL SERVICE RATE

The following schedule supersedes the former Small Commercial, Commercial and Industrial Power Classifications.

#### Demand Charge

First 50 kilowatt of billing demand per month — Nil  
Balance at \$1.90 per kilowatt of billing demand per month.

#### Energy Charge

3.8c per K.W.H. for the first 50 K.W.H. per month  
1.6c per K.W.H. for the next 200 K.W.H. per month  
1.45c per K.W.H. for the next 9750 K.W.H. per month  
Balance of monthly consumption at 0.5c per K.W.H.

The General Rate is based upon service at utilization voltage; where the customer provides transformation facilities, the authorized allowance of 25c per K.W. per month for stepdown from subtransmission voltage and 15c per K.W. per month for stepdown from distribution voltage will apply.

Minimum Monthly Bill — Under 50 K.W. — \$2.50

— Over 50 K.W. — .25c per K.W. for all K.W. applicable to the maximum demand during the previous eleven months.

#### COMMERCIAL SPACE HEATING

1.35c per K.W.H. for energy supplied through a separate meter as an alternative to the foregoing General Rate applicable to existing customers only.

### SCHEDULE APPLICABLE TO GLEN WILLIAMS:

#### RESIDENTIAL RATE

First 50 K.W.H. per month ..... 3.8c per K.W.H.  
Next 200 K.W.H. per month ..... 1.7c per K.W.H.  
1.0c per K.W.H. for all additional monthly consumption.

#### Metered Water Heating

A block of 500 K.W.H. per month at a special rate of 0.8c per K.W.H. is available to customers using an approved electric water heater supplied through the residential service meter after 250 K.W.H.'s per month have been billed at the foregoing rates.

Minimum Monthly Bill — \$2.50.

#### House Heating

Energy supplied through regular service meter at applicable rates.

#### GENERAL SERVICE RATE

#### Demand Charge

First 50 kilowatts of billing demand per month — Nil  
Balance at \$1.90 per kilowatt of billing demand per month

#### Energy Charge

3.8c per K.W.H. for the first 50 K.W.H. per month  
1.7c per K.W.H. for the next 200 K.W.H. per month  
1.45c per K.W.H. for the next 9750 K.W.H. per month  
Balance of monthly consumption at 0.5c per K.W.H.

#### DELAYED PAYMENT

A late payment charge of 10% shall apply to bills not paid on or before the due date.

### Jail Washroom Sinks Cited as Health Hazard

Condition of washroom sinks in Halton County jail was cited as a health hazard by the Grand Jury Wednesday in a report to Supreme Court judge Mr. Justice LaCourciere.

Heating, piping, electrical wiring and the spiral staircase are 'in very poor condition' the report stated and there is 'very poor ventilation and very low humidity throughout the building.'

The report said the problem with the sinks is one of missing traps.

#### Building Clean

Despite these defects in the almost century-old building, 'the surroundings are kept immaculately clean and the staff seem efficient and well-adjusted' the report said.

'Generally speaking, operating conditions and atmosphere at the jail are excellent,' the judge heard.

The Grand Jurymen said they understood the old, much-condemned building with its obsolete design will be replaced 'in the not too-distant future,' by a new county or regional jail.

Meanwhile, as short-term improvements, they suggested moving the EMO storage facilities from the existing prison vault to the Milton firehall thereby leaving this area for the admittance of prisoners and eliminating the necessity of 'unruly prisoners' being admitted on Brown Street.

#### Repair Sinks

They suggested repairs to the sinks, ventilation and electrical wiring and also converting the unused Crown Attorney's office into the jail governor's office.

This would avoid the current necessity of citizens who wish to see the governor entering the same door as the prisoners, the report said.

Mr. Justice LaCourciere assured the Grand Jurymen: 'Your recommendations will (emphasis on the word will) receive attention.'
