

High Salaries, No Communication Council's School Board Complaint

Rumblings of discontent with the county's new board of education set-up were heard at Monday's town council meeting when it appeared for a time that councillors would not pass a \$19,000 account, the first requisition by the new board.

One criticism, by Reeve Hunter and Deputy Reeve Spight, was that they had been led to believe that education costs would now be a separate tax bill, with taxpayers knowing what percentage of their tax money is being used for education.

"The board will be asking for money twice a month," said the reeve. "A lot of people, myself included, think it is going to be quite costly. I was led down the garden path by a person saying the board was going to issue its own tax levy. Now I find they are going to tell us how much they want and we will have to produce the money."

Reeve Hunter said council will have no control over what

the school board will be requisitioning... "and when you see salaries of \$29,000 to \$31,000, that's pretty wild" he remarked.

Cr. Bill Smith criticized the new board as 'high handed' and said he had reprimanded the reeve and deputy a year ago about the way the new board was instituted.

"Only one board member representing Georgetown on a 20 man board is a fare" he charged. "We are getting no communication at all from the board and anything I know I am getting by word of mouth or from our local newspaper."

"The one good thing about the new set-up was a separate tax bill" said Cr. Ern Hyde,

"and now we find this won't be so. We'll have to be on the alert with regional government now about to be stuffed down our throats too."

First deciding not to approve the \$19,000 payment, council reconsidered when Crs. Donna Denison and Sandy Mackenzie argued that two wrongs don't make a right, and it would be poor business to put the new board on the financial spot without temporary funds to pay salaries and other necessary bills.

Council invited Ernest Bodnar, the town's representative on the school board, to attend a committee meeting Thursday night, to explain how the board is operating.

McNally, Borland Wardens At St. George's Anglican

William McNally was re-elected people's warden and Bob Borland was appointed rector's warden at the annual vestry meeting of St. George's Anglican Church on Sunday evening. The meeting followed an evening service conducted by Rev'd Eric Mills.

Reviewing the financial report, Mr. McNally pointed to a drop in revenue, which made it impossible for the church to pay its \$5400 allotment for missions. A \$767 shortage will be carried into this year's budget.

Members voted an increase in salary and travel allowance to the rector, and approved a total budget of \$27,000 as the 1969 target. Total revenue last year was slightly over \$20,000, which included \$830 in special gifts to the Primate's World Relief Fund and Blafnar Relief.

John T. Armstrong and Irwin Noble were voted lay-delegates to synod with Paul Armstrong as an alternate. Michael Armstrong will continue as chairman of sidesmen; Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Thompson, auditors; and Mrs. Jim Costigan, envelope secretary.

Thomas Parry and Mrs. Esther Smith were reappointed representatives on the Canadian Bible Society branch.

Ed Wilson, Frank Tyrrell and Jim Costigan were elected members of the advisory council which also includes the wardens and lay delegates.
