



INJURED will be held in Georgetown Ambulance Service Rooms, James Street, will be held on TUESDAY, FEB. 11th at 7.30 p.m.

This course will continuè one night per week for seven weeks, followed by a written and practical examination in First Aid on the eighth night. Candidates for Certificate or Voucher will be given fourteen hours of instruction. Those trying for Medallion or Label will receive four additional hours of training. The awards issued to successful candidates are recognized by the Workmen's Compensation Board.

Since the tuition of most industrial workers under the WOB Act will be paid by the Workmen's Compensation Board, First Aiders' from industry are asked to supply the .instructor with the WCB number of their employer.
