

Two Georgetown Rinks in S&S Bonspiel Winning Circle

Georgetown rinks took two of the four titles up for grabs in the annual Smith and Stone Bonspiel which concluded Saturday at the Brampton Curling Club.

Third event champion was Lee Symmes of the North Halton Curling Club, while club mate John Mintern skipped his foursome to Fourth Event honors.

It was a case of boss beating down slave in the main event when Monte Holman met his regular vice-skip George St. Amond in the all-Bolton final and showed his third how the game should be played.

Brampton's Jim Fraser skipped his quartet to the second event championship.

Lee Symmes, Tony Hull, Bill Smeaton, and Paul Skinner captured the Third Event title with an 11-5 triumph over Milton's Dennis Rowley. The Symmes rink qualified for the final by beating Oakville's John Devais 8-5 in the semi.

Rowley reached the final by downing Georgetown's Jack Wendorf, Oliver Hunter, George McCormick and George Edmuntson.

John Mintern, Jim Dalton, Penn Kent, and Bob Hadden earned the Fourth Event laurels for North Halton by defeating Oakville's Jack Gunnig.

Mintern's rink defeated another Georgetown foursome, Fred Hancock, Joe Louth, Terry Sinclair, and Grant Emmerson

to advance to the Fourth Event final.

"George St. Amond, usually curls vice for me at the club and in any bonspiels we enter," explained main event champ Holman. "But for this spiel we had to split our regular rink. It was kind of funny, our meeting in the final."

The Saturday finals rounded out a week of curling activity in the Smith and Stone bonspiel for 64 rinks from curling clubs in Halton and Peel counties.

The bonspiel was set up for club rinks with just 31 points in club ratings.

Georgetown's North Halton club had eight rinks in competition.
