Hockey Midgets Finish First, Only 3 Losses

Georgetown Midgets have now completed their 18 game regular season schedule. As a result of the entire team's outstanding effort the boys finished the season in first place in the Tri-County League on the strength of a 13 wins, 2 ties and 3 losses record.

Individual players also gained recognition for their fine effort during the regular season.

Juri Kudrasovs took the Midget scoring title by counting 19 goals and 16 assists for 35 points. Also deserving mention for their scoring ability are: Paul Fendley who finished third with 16 goals and 11 assists for 27 points in 17 games; Marty Fowler who finished fifth with 16 goals and 9 assists for 25 points in 14 games; and Jerry Neit who came ninth with 9 goals and 12 assists for 21 points.

The Midget goaltending title was taken by John Blair and Doug Unsworth as they combined to limit the opposition to 35 goals in 18 games which gave them a sparkling 1.94 goal average.

High School Senior Rebs In Basketball Playoffs

Georgetown high seniors sewed up a District 10 Basketball League berth with victories over Guelph teams Wednesday and Friday.

Georgetown's ticket to the playoffs was a 46-37 victory over Guelph Centennial Spartans on Wednesday, and the insurance came Friday in a 31-28 squeaker over Guelph CVI Gaels.

In Friday's test, Georgetown came up with a thrilling last minute press to fashion the three point win. Excellent fan support, numerically and vocally, obviously influenced the winners' drive.

High scorers for the senior Rebels have been Dave DeSylva Nigel Gunding and Freddie Harris with the strong rear-guard being led by Hughie Williams.

Meanwhile the Georgetown juniors, although missing the playoffs, have been exciting the crowds with their spirited determination. Only their own defensive errors cost them their games against Spartans and Gaels junior editions.

Ron Fogal, who scored 17 points Friday night, has been junior Rebs high scorer.

The performance of the senior team in the last two games has led senior coach Gerry Thompson to expect them to be top contenders for the playoff title.

Overtime Goal Robs Raiders Of Chance to Catch Huskies

Georgetown Intermediate Raiders pushed league leading Durham Huskies to the brink before surrendering a 4-3 overtime win in Durham Sunday.

A Georgetown win would have created a three-way tie at the top of Intermediate B circuit with Georgetown, Durham and Lucan entangled. Durham now owns the lead by two points over Lucan who have the same cushion on third place Georgetown.

After a scoreless first period, Durham showed Raiders their heels and ran up a 3-0 advantage in front of an ecstatic capacity crowd who had been denied this encounter when it was originally scheduled a couple of weeks ago. At that time the flu bug showing Durham favoritism, levelled so many Raiders the game had to be rescheduled.

In the absence of high scoring Raiders' Paul Robinson and Jack Gudgeon, Blake Inglis undertook to show Huskies a sample of Raiders' explosive fire power. He did all the Georgetown scoring, notching the

team's first goal near the end of the second period, and putting the clubs on even terms in the third.

O'Flaherty from Allen and Rahn, Steakers from Schiefer, and Vaughan from Aitken were the Durham marksmen. Norton assisted on Inglis' first goal, Terry Lane and Phil Lavell toiled on the second one, and Max Stafford and Jim Blair did the ground work on his third with about eight minutes gone in the third period.

The remaining 12 minutes of regulation time left the fans limp. Georgetown's Lockhurst and Durham's Beaker performed wizardry at both ends of the ice thwarting rush after rush.

Both teams showed the effects of the fast pace in the overtime and on-the-go line changes were frequent.

Lockhurst had no chance on the one that ended it. Allen's shot into a forest of bodies in front of his net caromed off a player and into the twine.

A sidelight was a personal

clash between Terry Rodgers of Georgetown and Aiken of Durham who discovered each other in the first period and shared fighting and high sticking sentences.

Playing at home on Friday, Georgetown rolled to an 8-4 victory over Fergus Thistles, but not until after Fergus had put two goals together.

Fergus had Raiders down 3-2 after 20 minutes. The second session ended 4-4 and Raiders took charge in the third to double their output.

Phil Lavell with a pair, Dave Subject, Bill Wheeler, Doucette, Terry Lane, Don Norton and Terry Rodgers were Georgetown snipers. Former Georgetown Junior Doug Selby netted two for the losers. Brown and Harper got the other two.
