

Fair Board Annual Meeting Elects Stuart Hall President for 1969

1968 Fair Successful Event Despite Weather, Report Shows

The annual meeting of the Georgetown Agricultural Society which sponsors Georgetown Fair... was held in Knox Church hall on Wednesday evening of last week. Although the weather was anything but inviting to go out in, forty directors sat in for a pot-luck supper prior to the meeting.

The directors picked Stuart Hall to head the board for 1969, the position of president being held by Keith Webb for the past two years.

Mr. Hall thanked the directors for the honour and pledged his full support for the coming year. He expressed the thanks of the board to Mr. Webb for a job well done during his term of office.

Treasurer Robert Lawson gave the financial report, which showed another successful year in 1968. Receipts over disbursements showed a surplus on the year's operations of \$599.19. Total receipts were \$9,163.86 and expenditures totalled \$8,564.67.

Income highlights included — Grants \$8,192.75; Donations and advertising \$1,489.07; membership and entry fees \$1,998.50; concessions \$750; gate receipts \$2,207.06. On the expenditure side prize money took the big slice at \$4,348.46, judging rosettes and cups \$728.93; administration including salaries, ambulance, band, emcee, printing, P.A. systems \$2,193.11.

FLUORIDE AVAILABLE AT GEORGETOWN CLINIC

Friday, is Georgetown's day on the busy schedule of North Halton dental hygienist Mrs. Mary Ludzik and her assistant Mrs. H. Stroud. Each Friday morning they operate a dental fluoride clinic in the Halton County Health Unit office on Main St. S., however it's expected the clinic will be moved to more spacious quarters at the opposite end of the downtown business section soon.

Last year, nearly 4,000 children between the ages of 3 and 12 had the decay arrestive compound applied to their teeth; and with the addition of five more schools, the figure could exceed 5,000 during 1969.

There are 28 public and separate schools in the section of the county serviced by dental hygienist Mrs. M. Ludzik and her assistant, Mrs. H. Stroud.

This includes five in Burlington and three in Oakville, towns each having their own dental health services; but the eight out of area schools are left to North Halton due to their proximity.

Appointments for the fluoride application and a form requiring parents' consent are made out either through the child's school or through the Halton County Health Unit, of which dental care is a division.

Actual contact with children inside the school, however is mainly through films and addresses educating them to the preventative steps — ensuring good oral hygiene — and this service is also available to outside organizations free of charge.

Since it has been proven fluoridated water reduces tooth decay appreciably, though, it is felt initiation of a more elaborate dental program in un-fluoridated areas is of less value than in areas where this first step has been taken.

Dental Directors across Canada and USA have declared Feb. 29 Dental Health Week.

Reeve have some expression of his municipality's feelings which could be conveyed to the committee for discussion.

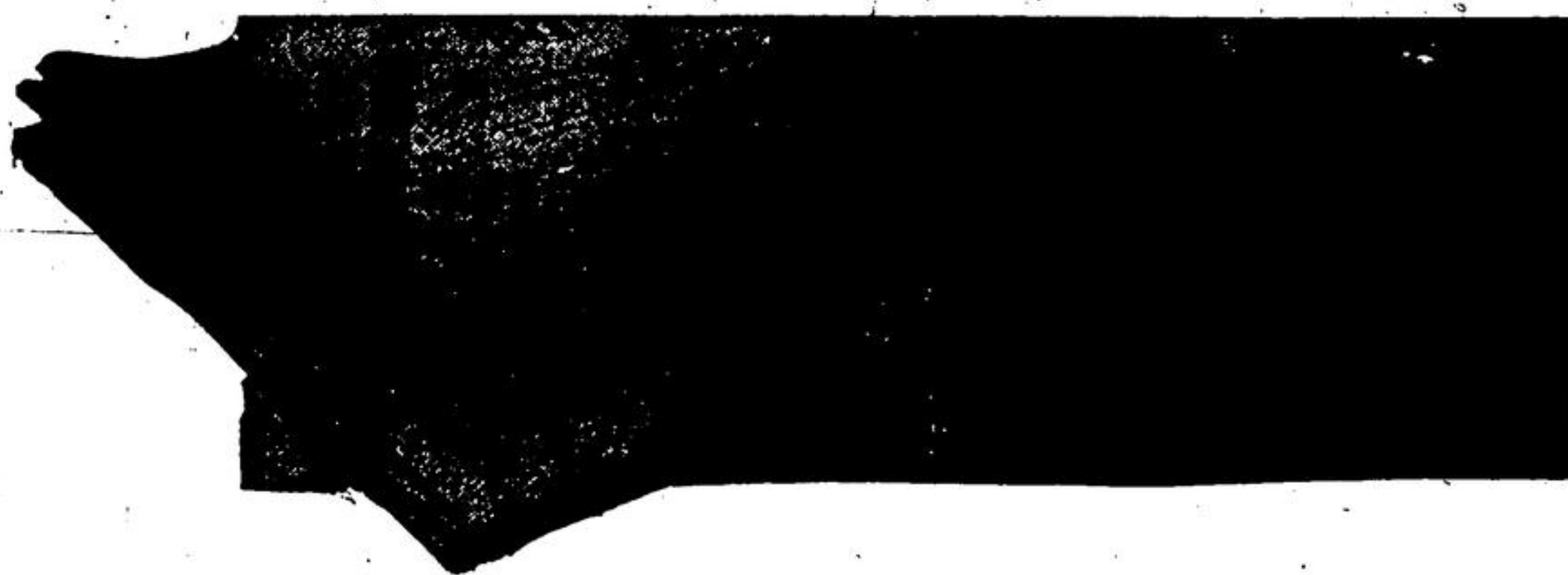
Warden George Currie underlined this fact and the council approved the seven man committee that will have a representative from each of the county's municipalities.
