Ord at Council

ded the town council meeting to explain his resignation to them.

"You have done a service in your one-man-walkout," he was told by Cr. Ern Hyde. "For years council has tried to show taxpayers the tremendous cost of education in a chart enclosed with the tax bill but no one seemed to realize 60c of every tax dollar is going to this department."

Mayor Wheldon Emerson said announcement of the salary increases "has been one of the most startling things" which has happened on the municipal scene and is making people realize just what education is costing.

"This has created more discussion than any education matter since my time on council," he said. "Up to now there have only been vague statements about the cost of education."

He told Judge Ord that council has asked Ernest Bodnar, the town's elected representative on the new school board, to attend a meeting to brief them on the board's plans and financing.

While the judge appeared to have cooled down somewhat since his original action, he told council that the salary rise will undoubtedly spark a move for more money all along the line.

"This was a 15% increase on two already high salaries," he pointed out. "The provincial government is stressing economy today, but apparently not in this area."

Judge Ord said that the greatest surprise had been to find that the board members from Georgetown and Acton had been the deciding factors in the 10-8 vote.

"I am disappointed that usually conservative North Halton took this action," he said.

He stressed that he was not criticizing the capabilities of the director of education. And despite his criticism of Mr. Bodnar for this action, he told council they have a topnotch board member who has served Georgetown well on the local board and will be an asset to the county body.

He said the town is turning over a top high school to elected officials, a building without frills yet with the best in accommodation and instruction, a good staff and principal and praised the old Georgetown high school board for their hard work in providing this.

Returning to salaries, he said that Sarnia pays \$29,500 for a similar position.

With regional government in the offing here, he said some Georgetown councillors may some day be on a regional council.

"I hope when you do that you will carefully scrutinize salary scales," he said. "I feel the duty of a school board is to give the education of students and the use of the tax dollar equal consideration."

Mr. Ord said that with elected rather than appointed school board members, education now has come into the field of government.

"Elected officials are now spending tax money," he said, "and every taxpayer has the right to ask these elected officials for explanations."

CAT, DOG OWNERS SHOULD INNOCULATE
Everyone who owns cats or dogs should get his pets inoculated with anti-rabies serum annually, urged Inspector Allan McNab of the Humane Society this week.

This precaution by pet owners is the only way to ever keep the spread of rabies under control in a community he said.

"Rabies is definitely in Halton right now," he said, "and the only way to keep it at bay is the co-operation of everyone."

However, he emphasized, the public should not panic at the word 'rabies' as the disease is not communicable unless a person is actually bitten or scratched by a rabid animal.

The rabies virus which attacks nerve cells is transmitted by an animal's saliva through broken skin into the nerve cells, and is not airborne. Nevertheless, the disease, sometimes known as hydrophobia, is extremely dangerous and usually fatal to humans if anti-rabies inoculations are not given, said McNab.

The Halton County Health Unit should be notified immediately whenever a person is bitten or scratched by an animal so that a diagnosis can be made he said.

"It's necessary to consider the circumstances of the wound before coming to a conclusion" said McNab.
