Negotiations 'Satisfactory' School Teachers' Spokesman

Salary negotiations between Halton teachers and the county board of education are "proceeding satisfactorily" according to a spokesman for secondary school teachers.

The spokesman is a representative of the Halton County executive of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation.

He would make no further comment, however, and said that a joint release by the OSS.T.F. and the board of education will be issued soon.

The board last week decided to take immediate steps to streamline its policies for negotiating teachers' salaries.

Special Meeting

The trustees were told at a special meeting that there is need for consideration of divergent policies throughout the county with respect to salary,

benefits and negotiating procedures.

The new county board was warned recently by Judge John Ord that the pay increases to senior administration officials would mean that teachers all over the county will want to relate to the same salary rate.

\$31,500 Salary

Protesting the \$31,500 salary paid to director of education James W. Singleton, Judge Ord resigned last month from a steering committee composed of outgoing former boards.

Oakville trustee Richard Goodin backed Judge Ord and objected to the full range of salaries being paid senior administrative officials. Goodin was one of eight trustees who had opposed the salary set for the director of education.
