# School Costs Worry Acton Council Too

Though they have not gone so far as with-holding requisitioned money, other north Halton municipalities have had much the same reaction as Georgetown's to this month's financial demands from the Halton County Board of Education.

A former school trustee, now with Acton council, Orval Chapman, forecast two weeks ago the February requisition from the board "will jolt us out of our chairs."

Last week, without joy, Acton council decided to part with the \$45,000 for February costs, but sent an inquiring letter about the amount to the board's Oakville headquarters.

Georgetown council went further by refusing to pass a motion to pay the \$181,000 they had been asked for.

On being informed by clerk Joe Hurst that Georgetown was rejecting the requisition temporarily, Acton Mayor Les Dudy said he was less concerned about the current bill than future bites and effect on Acton borrowing by-law.

"The unknown figures are what we have to worry about. This could hit us hard later because the town did not expect to pay school costs out of current borrowings," he stated.
