

Junior Youth Bowlers Still in the Running

Georgetown has another group of young bowlers on the path to a National title.

Last year, a pair of Georgetown Youth Bowlers won the National Doubles championship in Edmonton.

Now, after two steps of the four steps to Stardom completed, a team of Georgetown Junior Boys is still in the running for National honours.

Craig Johnston, Steve Burns, Rick Haines, Tom Hall and Mike Warman, breezed to a win in the Zone roll-offs at the Park Royal Lanes at Clarkson on the weekend beating the closest of 11 other Junior Boys teams by 300 pins.

This was their second "Step to Stardom". Made their first "step" in local competitions at Georgetown Bowl which ended a week earlier. Their third "step" will be the Ontario roll-offs at Plantation Bowl in Toronto, March 2.

Winners here will proceed to Hamilton to contest the Bantam, Junior and Senior national laurels.

Gary Miller, who with Bob Montgomery won the National Bantam Doubles last year, came second in Bantam singles roll-offs at the Zone level, though he rolled a good 624 triple. Steve Fowler of Guelph won it with 718.

Georgetown Junior girls finished fifth of 12 teams; and Bantam girls were 3rd. Carolyn Barber, bowling in Bantam singles, was 5th.

Junior girls and boys singles and boys and girls senior teams will have their Zone roll-offs at Oaktown Bowl in Oakville.

Georgetown had another winner at Clarkson in Karen Mintern, the 17 year old local entry in the Zone Bowling Queen contest. She was awarded her trophy and sash by Georgetown Reeve William Hunter.

Karen will compete against 16 other young Bowling Queens from other Zones at the Provincial roll-offs.

The snowball that will carry Georgetown Juveniles to British Columbia in April has started to roll.

Club manager Red Asseltine told The Herald this week that two businesses have already responded with donations. Georgetown had the Harvesters down 8-2 late in the third period before surrendering a pair of goals 28 seconds apart. Paul Robinson back on the goal scoring wagon and Terry Lane each fired two goals while Blake Inglis, Jack Gudgeon, Terry Rodgers and Max Stafford added the rest. Alex Smith, R. King, Gord Thompson and T. Murrison did the Harvesters scoring.

His blast from centre ice, which went for his second goal of the game, tied things at 6-6 and 44 seconds later he broke the deadlock scoring from close range. Blake Inglis salted it away with the eighth Georgetown goal, into an open net with two seconds left.

Wayne Davison set the stage for the Georgetown rally with a powerplay drive from the blue-line that narrowed the Cheltenham lead to 6-5.

Max Stafford, Don Norton and Terry Lane, netted the other Georgetown markers.

Georgetown's rally came after a scoreless second period.

Wednesday, Seaforth scored three times in a row in the last half of the third period to steal the 6-4 victory.

A goal by Paul Robinson

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near the nine minute mark of the last stanza gave Georgetown a 4-3 advantage but Seaforth roared back with goals by Buettemuller, Maffwain, and Jim Dick to complete the upset.

Georgetown snipers Blake Inglis, Don Norton and Terry Lane, and Seaforth marksmen McLaughlin, Buettemuller and Tom Dick accounted for the early scoring.
