

Ice Conflict Forces Crucial 4th Game to Merchantland

Since this story was written, Georgetown lost to Milton 9-7 Tuesday night and currently trail the series three games to nil.

Another weighty handicap, has been draped around the already overburdened neck of the Georgetown Junior C Raiders. The locals started the 1968-69 schedule with one handicap, an almost totally rookie team, and since then have collected more handicaps than a winning team.

High scoring forward Terry Lewick's decision to play on the west coast instead of returning to the Raiders' livery, a steady flow of key players to the side-lines with slow-healing hurts, the loss of Ray Inglis to Midget ranks, and the rough task of battling red hot Milton Merchants in the opening round of the loop playoffs.

To these have been added a crusher. Because of lack of ice time, Georgetown juniors will play four of their first five games in Milton arena.

The club executive voted unanimously Monday night to play the fourth game of the best of seven set in the county town tomorrow night. In scheduling the first five games of the series Georgetown and Milton agreed to play the first, third and fifth games in Milton and the second and fourth in Georgetown.

Georgetown lost in Milton last Friday 7-5, and back here Sunday 12-7. Game three will go in Milton Tuesday night, but because an earlier agreement with the Georgetown Intermediate Hockey Club for ice time here tomorrow night has fallen through, game four will have to be played in Milton as well.

"An agreement between the junior and intermediate clubs and the arena manager fell through when the intermediates changed their mind and refused to give up the ice time," a junior Raider official told The Herald. "They were to have played their home game on Sunday instead of Friday," he said.

He said the best of seven series has to be completed by March 5.

In looking over the hands played last week at the Acton Bridge Club, I came across this gem. The point of the hand can be easily overlooked at rubber bridge, but the truth is there on the travelling score where all the results are listed.

East dealt with North-South vulnerable.

Maybe you didn't see any problem as you bid this hand to yourself. So how come three experienced bridge players end up playing this hand at two spades.

Georgetown May Pass Up Inter-County

Georgetown may not have an Intercounty Fastball team to take advantage of the new lighting system going into the Georgetown Park this year.

Despite this added incentive Georgetown was still without a representative when the Intercounty Fastball League held their initial pre-season conclave Monday night in Glen Williams.

The loop this year will be composed of the Glen, Rockwood, Belwood, Guelph, and Hillsburgh. Georgetown, a contender two years ago, but absent from the circuit last season may still hook into the 1969 action, but so far there has been no indication to that effect.

Other teams in the league are receptive to a Georgetown entry since it would make for a greater variety of opposition and still not appreciably add to their travelling mileage.

A Georgetown club would also rekindle fastball interest here and add one more worthwhile outlet for local sports followers. The Intercounty League exhibits a good calibre of fastball and drew more spectators last season than any previous.

The 1968 president and secretary treasurer Fred Engley and Gil Preston were returned to office at the Monday meeting. They'll have the team managers as the balance of their executive.

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Council Differs, Would Overrule Planning Board Apartment Veto

A planning board recommendation that would deny Aler Investments the right to build a 46 suite apartment building at 104 Main St. N., found little favour with some council members Monday, including the two council representatives on Planning Board.

Al Politi of Aler Investments, told council the plan conformed in every way to the new amended plan presently before the Ontario Municipal Board. "The apartment building on one and a half acres, has a surrounding green belt of more than 35% required," he explained "and there is one and a half parking spaces per unit, as required."

The builder told council the Planning Board wanted him to develop the whole site at once, forcing him to tear down the rest home immediately, and try to buy the gas company building, right away. The present gas company building and the rest home face Main St. N. The proposed apartment site faces Carrothers Road across from Ewing Street.

contact the Dept. of Highways about posting a sign at the corner of Mountainview Road and Highway 7 in Georgetown directing motorists to Glen Williams. Since a Glen resident, Mrs. Marie Beaumont requested the sign a few weeks ago, Esquema and Georgetown council has approved the sign, but there has been debate about whether its installation is the responsibility of either, or Halton County or the Dept. of Highways.

Passed a by-law accepting a new Glen Williams street, Glen Crescent Drive, as a public road and taking over its maintenance.

Passed a by-law providing for a \$204,000 expenditure to take care of township roads in 1969, an amount approved by the OMB and another for \$84,300 for the same purposes which has not yet been given approval.

Decided to forego expropriation proceedings in favour of creating a slight jog in the Check Line when the new bridge is constructed near the 8th Line corner. To keep the approaches to the new bridge straight, council would have to expropriate land on the south side of the road. They agreed the jog created in the road by adding all the extra land required on the north side would not be worth the bother of expropriating an equal portion portion of property on the south side.
