Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service held their elections Sunday and the following personnel were elected as the 1959 executive: Chief, Ken Thomson; deputy chief, Tom Massena; secretary, Barry Eady; treasurer, Doug Herrington; Capt. Group one, Art Stamp; Lieutenants, Walter Steinke, Eric Stone, Bill Stone, Russ Stephens; capt. group two, Ace Bailey; Lieutenants, Richard Foster, Bob Enslin, Frank Tyrrell, George Logan; floating lieutenant, Jack Armstrong.

The report for the year 1958 was given and showed the ambulance responded to 243 calls as follows: 112 normal calls, 127 emergency calls, 3 public gatherings and took part in the Milton Hospital Disaster Plan. Of the emergency calls, 35 were highway accidents and 9 were industrial accidents. It was noted the industrial accidents seemed high for the number of industries and industrial workers in Georgetown.

Letters of appreciation received during the year were read and deputy reeve Art Speight representing council, thanked the members for their service. The upcoming Disaster Plan exercise at Georgetown & District Memorial Hospital was mentioned and the fact that the Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service would be taking part.

A discussion was held on the present low membership and members were asked to be on the lookout for new members to help bolster the presently low number. The meeting finished with refreshments served by social chairman Fred Hue.
