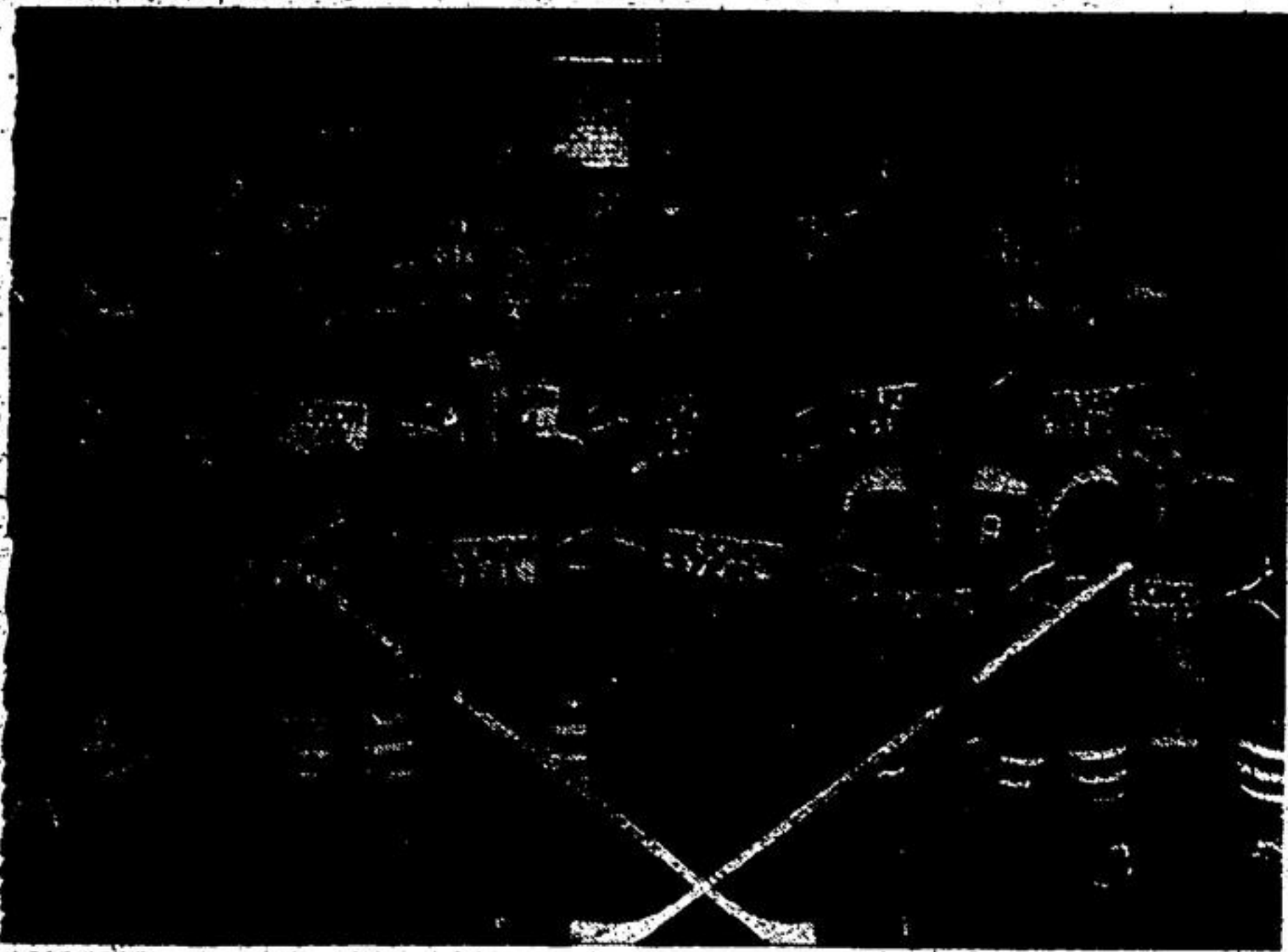


Crucial Game Tonight for Hockey Bantams

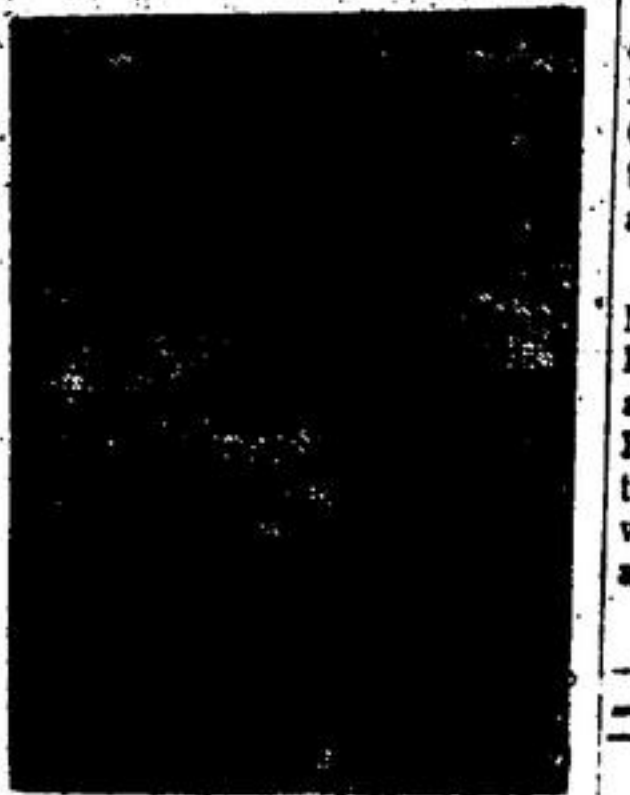
Georgetown Bantams are trailing Orillia two games to one after their 3-1 loss in Orillia on March 1st in the first round of their OMHA playoff series.

Breaks Two Records In 300 Yard Feature

Georgetown's Tony Powell broke the Canadian Open and native records in winning a 300 yard race at an invitational indoor track meet at Ypsilanti, Michigan, Saturday.

Powell, a member of the East York Track Club, was clocked in 31.1 seconds, four-fifths of a second faster than the previous best Canadian time set by Tommie Smith of San Jose, California last year and tied two weeks ago in Toronto.

The 4 Chipper Court resident, with Bill Crothers, Peter McMahon, and Bill Franklin comprised the East York mile relay team which won that event in 3:18.6. Crothers ran the second leg in 49.4 seconds, but Powell bettered that in the anchor leg which he ran in 48.7.

Lopsided Defeat by Merchants Ends Junior Raiders' Season

Milton Merchants in all out attack blasted Georgetown out of the OHA Suburban Junior C League quarter finals with a 19-3 shelling in Milton, Friday.

The thumping erased the OHA Junior C champions from the 1969 playoff picture in the minimum four games. The fourth Milton-Georgetown meeting was to have been played in Georgetown originally but a conflict with the Intermediate Bs forced its relocation.

Milton officials were thrilled with the way their club steam-rolled over their rivals and took it as an omen of the team's fortunes in their quest for the same honour attained by the club they had just humbled.

"That was the best I have ever seen the team play" said Merchant's executive Dieter Claer. "They were skating, hitting and shooting. They put on a terrific show."

Don Hearn led the potent Milton attack with five goals. Kip Tuckwell tallied three times as did Bob Robson. Steve Basteard, Graham Hern and Marty Seeds each netted two goals while singles went to Ted Hood and Steve Lawrence.

Bill Dwyer, Jack Kemshead

and Frank King scored for Raiders.

Merchants launched 89 shots at the Georgetown goalies while Lloyd Vaughn in the Merchants' net faced 20 shots from Raiders.

Bob Stoddart started in the Georgetown goal, but was replaced in the second period by Wayne Copeland. Stoddart returned to face Merchant snipers again in the final period.

Merchants got off to a good start with four goals in the opening period. They increased their lead to 11-0 after two completed periods of play, and added eight more goals in the final period. Georgetown got in the scoresheet with their three goals in the third.

Milton had a 14-0 lead before Dwyer spoiled Vaughn's bid for a shut out at 9:35 of the third period.

Over 900 fans in Milton's Brown street arena thoroughly enjoyed the action with the two clubs netting 22 goals. And they also saw two scraps in the third period.

In one fight Milton's Jim Chalkley tangled with Raiders' Brad Johnson. The other fight had Rick Col6-squaring off with Georgetown's Brian Loucks.
