

Opportunity for Officer Careers with Lorne Scots

The Lorne Scots are put to get recruits.

With its establishment as part of Canada's Mobile Command Reserve the Peel Dufferin and Halton regiment is becoming youth-oriented and taking on a new lease of life. It is seeking to enlist energetic, ambitious young men between the ages of 18 and 25, to train them for duty in the army reserve.

The man who has been given the big job of directing the campaign is Capt. James Muir. With a background of 12 years' radio, he has a good knowledge of publicity methods, and is out to make a success of the assignment handed him by his commanding officer Lt.-Col. E. F. Lince of Georgetown.

Crack Unit

"We are considered to be one of the best reserve units in Canada" said Capt. Muir. "We are out to prove that General Coffin didn't make any mistake in promoting us."

General G. R. Coffin is officer

commanding headquarters Ontario region Dept. of National Defence in Oakville.

Capt. Muir is hoping to enlist 100 recruits. They will be given general military training at the unit's armory on Thomas Street under Capt. Frank Ching training officer. Training sessions are held weekly on Wednesday evenings. The recruits will receive basic foot drill and foot drill with weapons. They will be taught weapon handling, the use of the rifle and how to strip it.

"When they have obtained their general military training they will move on to infantry," explained Capt. Muir. "Once they have attained this status they are eligible for Mobile Command training. This is given one weekend a month throughout the winter months. They receive instruction from regular army equipment and are brought up to as high a regular army standard as possible. They do get tough training. They earn their pay while they train."

Arms School

There will be a training week end at the combat arms school at Camp Borden, Feb. 21-23 when 100 men of all ranks will go from the Lorne Scots. Capt. Muir expects that the recruits can be put in shape for the Mobile Command games at Camp Petawawa this summer.

"In the Lorne Scots we feel we offer the young man something he can't get anywhere else" said Capt. Muir. "We give him the opportunity to learn a trade. We teach him self-discipline. After we're finished with him he has a pride in himself. And we pay the men at the regular army rate."

"We are looking for officer candidates. There's a great future for a man who wants to become an officer. We are looking for lads who have their Grade 12 and are interested in being junior officers. Training for these junior officers is harder than for the regular soldiers."

Capt. Muir transferred from the 8th Field Regiment of Hamilton to the Lorne Scots last September. He was formerly commander of B Company Lorne Scots. This company is now known as A Company and is commanded by Major A. G. Lowe. B Company Brampton is commanded by Capt. Ian Kirkwood. C Company Georgetown is under the command of Major Orville Kelchison and D Company Brampton has Major Larry Whitehorn as its commanding officer. Each of the companies is responsible for supplying a certain number of recruits.

Reserve Unit

The Lorne Scots is the only reserve unit between Toronto and Hamilton and A Company covers the area between Port Credit and Burlington. The regiment is one of a number of reserve units in Ontario selected for Mobile Command training.

"This is done so that in the event of a national emergency the Dept. of National Defence has a trained reserve ready to move into the regular army structure immediately."

"Our slogan is 'Go Lorne Scots. Slogan the tough one.'"

Farm Improvements Need Keen Analysis

Livestock barns, silos, and grain storage facilities, are farm improvements which represent a large investment for most Halton farmers. Decisions to invest in additional improvements require careful analysis.

An improvement costing, say, \$20,000 added to a farm that would sell for \$80,000 does not make the farm worth \$100,000. A recent study of farm sales in Ontario found that farm buyers discount most farm improvements fairly heavily. With some exceptions, improvements rarely add their full "depreciated cost" to sale price.

In most cases in this county the improvement would add from 0 to 33% to the farm sale price. This means that you must be sure that your plans are long enough to recover most of your investment before the farm will be sold. This is especially true for livestock barns and silos in this county. Plan on recovering your capital in an improvement at a faster rate than it depreciates. Otherwise do not carry out the improvement. Remember that your net worth will be lower right after you put up an improvement than it was before if the improvement does not add its full cost to the market value of the property.

There are some cases when it would be more profitable to sell out and buy a farm with the improvements you want than to add improvements to your present farm.
