Wrestlers Third in Province—Two are All-Ontario Champs

Two Georgetown youngsters, although light in weight, are giants in the eyes of wrestling fans. The two all-Ontario champions, bolstered by three 3rd-place winners and supported strongly by the rest of the team fought Georgetown into third place in the All Ontario high school wrestling championships Saturday night in North Bay Memorial Gardens.

Tiger Joe Fobert, 90 pounds, became Georgetown's first (ever) all Ontario champion in the first match of the finals after sweeping all other opponents under the mat. Joe was easily the class of his weight division as he handled every situation on the mat with the skill and aplomb of a true champion.

Norman Ferguson, 98 pounds, followed Joe's example in a barn burner that went into extra rounds. Norm's display of determination, skill and sheer courage won him the decision, and as the referee raised the winner's arm the Georgetown rooters shot to their feet in clamorous approval.

Second all-Ontario champion grinned weakly at his coach and hobbled over to be hugged by coach Joe Ingarozza and champion number one.

For a few seconds 188 pounds of wrestling excellence cast one shadow on the floor; and then two grinning boys stood in the glare of the floodlights and acknowledged the cheers of the noisiest rooting section of the area.

Continuing the victory tradition, Clive Llewellyn, 106 lbs., Doug Hills, 141 pounds and Jack Walinga 148 pounds each won his match in the consolation round to place third in that weight class. These three missed getting into the finals.

The popularity of this sport is certainly growing as well over 50 students, plus several parents and teachers made the trip to North Bay to support their team.

Coach Joe Ingarozza was proud of his team, but said he felt sorry for some of the boys who fought so well and yet lost in a crucial match.

"Every one of them wrestled his heart out," said coach Ingarozza, "but in a championship match one little mistake can mean the difference between winning and losing."
