

NOVICE, MIDGET CHAMPIONSHIPS IN 4-TOWN HOCKEY TOURNAMENT

Georgetown and Milton cut the grand championship cake right down the middle at the annual four town hockey tournament in Milton, Saturday.

Georgetown won Novice and Midget championships, while Milton took Bantam and PeeWee laurels.

Georgetown also copped the Bantam Consolation title, while their other entry made it to the PeeWee finals.

PeeWee and Novice consolation titles were won by Acton. The other town represented was Fergus.

The tournament annually pits all-star teams from the town's house leagues against each other. Georgetown's entries were made up of material drawn from Legion-sponsored Saturday Morning Hockey Leagues, Junior A, American, NHL and Senior A.

The well-run tourney included 13 games.

Wayne Storringer scored twice and Robbie Hamilton and Glenn Fendley once each for Georgetown in the Novice championship 4-2 victory over Milton.

Georgetown Novices got the final by dumping Acton 4-1 on goals by Robbie Hamilton (2), Glenn Fendley and Scott Beckett.

The Midget championship was decided on a one game winner take all basis with Georgetown fashioning a 4-3 win over Milton. Winner's goal scorers in this one were Mike Phillips, Charlie Fendley, and Marc Damphousse.

In blanking Fergus 6-0 to gain the Bantam consolation

Raiders, Thistles are Tied In Hockey Quarter Finals

Georgetown Raiders and Fergus Thistles are even seven after two games of their OHA Intermediate B Western League best of seven quarter final.

Twelve Member Body Proposed To Coordinate Parks, Recreation

A master plan which could gain Georgetown as much as \$6,000 in yearly government grants and co-ordinate parks and major recreation facilities under guidance of a recreation committee, was presented last week by Cr. Donna Denison.

Mrs. Denison, a new Ward 2 council member who is chairing the present arena and swimming pool boards, Cedarvale board and a this year, presented her brief to a meeting at Cedarvale Community Centre. Attending were representatives from council, arena and swimming pool boards, Cedarvale Centre and the several service clubs.

Speakers included Pat Ashwin, district consultant for the

Ontario Department of Education and Mrs. Pat Artkin, executive secretary, Ontario Municipal recreation association.

Mrs. Denison's plan envisages a 12 member recreation committee composed of members of the present arena and swimming pool boards, council, Cedarvale board and a recreation services group formed last fall.

There would be changes in name of two present boards. The board of parks management which actually operates the arena, would be renamed arena board. Ditto the Community Centre Board would be called

more properly swimming pool board.

And a new Board of Parks Management would be created, charged with administering parks, boulevards and drives.

The Municipal Recreation Committee would act as a clearing house and advisory body for the others and provide a better basis for long range planning by studying total recreation needs.

Mrs. Denison stressed that her report casts no reflection on present or past members of any town boards. Nor does she envisage any interference with voluntary groups interested in such activities as hockey and baseball.
