IN THE MAIL BAG
Dear Sir: After some years as an active follower of Community affairs and letters to the editor on many subjects, I was on the point of making comments following the letters of Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Millward. However, as both these ladies have now discovered, protesters are usually ignored, because the general public is apathetic. Were they not, such motions as the pay increase, would not pass, without so much adverse comment, as to make them an embarrassment to the mover.

However, Mrs. Hall, I agree with you, and add my voice, to yours in disgust though not in surprise, at this latest example of arrogance, once the election posters are off the lawn.

The ridiculous and pointless argument put forward by Mr. Morrow is a futile attempt at justifying bad government. It once again indicates that community betterment is not the first consideration in seeking election. It indicates again that the elector, who must pay the bill, has little chance to guide the course of the community. The good councillor, fails to remark that most increases obtained through strike action, for example as in the recent Ontario Hydro case are kept to between 12 1/2% to 20% and that I think, shows the wrong with this council motion. I do not believe that anyone would have argued against a reasonable increase in remuneration. What is wrong is that none of the prospective councillors mentioned even the thought of applying for an increase in their election

speeches, but when safely in the seat, just prior to consideration of the budget estimates, to sidle in with a FIFTY PER CENT increase. Therein lies the wrong Mr. Morrow.

You can rationalize all you like, in print and out of it, but the move was, is and will remain so unjustified. If the position is proving not worth the stated amount, when you applied, you should resign, not change the rules to suit yourself.

Had you stated from the platform that this was one of your intentions, you would not have been there today.

Just as with the two year term, which even now has never gone to the public for a decision, this latest move shows the contempt that elected representatives show for the voters once the seat is theirs. I do trust the employees of the Corporation will fare as well in their negotiations for an increase.

May others, besides Mrs. Hall and myself have long memories.

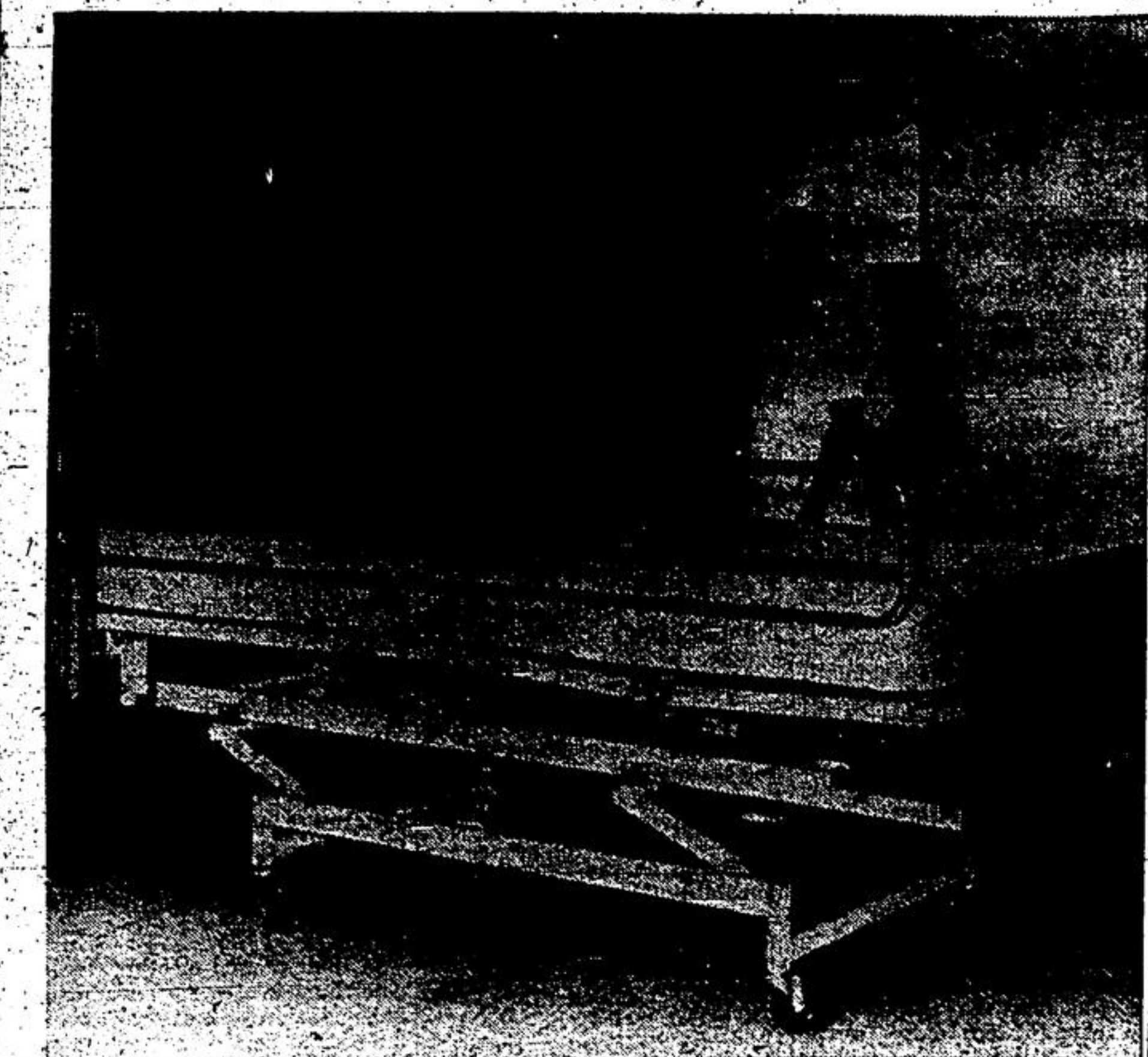
