This is the time of year when Canadian sports fans are beginning to think ahead to summer entertainment. The Georgetown Minor Soccer Association is expecting that many local boys will be thinking of soccer as "their" sport this year.

The Association has had a busy winter. Back in November they elected a new executive committee for 1969 with Terry Leggett, last year's soccer correspondent, as president. Other officers elected were:

Jan Barclay, vice president; Bob Marshall, secretary; John Dalziel, treasurer; Ivan Bird, match secretary; Don Henderson and June Wilde, registration; Bill Gordon, equipment; Bill Rannachan, entertainment.

Past president Bill Barclay stays on the executive and has also taken the job as our representative to the Halton and Peel District Association.

A registration of approximately 500 boys between the ages of 8 and 18 is expected in the '69 season, which makes a considerable revamping of our house leagues necessary. This year we are following the Ontario Soccer Association pattern with regard to the age groups. This means that boys under nine years of age will be called At-

oms, under 11, Mosquito under 13 PeeWee under 15 Bantam and under 18 Junior B. Of course the groupings depend upon the volume of registration but they expect to need a number of additional coaches and managers. Anyone interested please contact a member of the executive.

Registration takes place on Saturdays March 22 and 29, at the Canadian Legion on Mill St. and the fee this year is \$1.50 which includes \$1.00 for FULL insurance coverage. All equipment, except footwear, is provided thanks to their sponsors.

Most games this year will be played at Cedarvale Centennial Park and they are hoping to have changing and shower facilities installed before the start of the season. They hope also to use the high school gymnasium for pre-season coaching sessions.

Those fans interested in social activities will be pleased to know that another series of dances is in the planning stage. Entertainment chairman Bill Rannachan mentions July 1 as a tentative date for the first with the others following at bi-monthly intervals.

The association is looking forward to another successful season with more and more Georgetown boys enjoying participa-

Second Golf Course, Homes Planned by Georgetown Club

Georgetown Golf & Country Club on Georgetown's northern limits announced this week they have a landscape architect and golf course architect working on plans for a second course surrounded by estate type homes adjoining the present layout.

A club official told The Herald the project will take shape on a 150 acre piece of land purchased on the south side of No. 17 Sideroad from Esta Gitel Ltd of Toronto.

But as well as acquiring the additional land Georgetown Golf & Country club directors have been focussing some attention on the present 18 hole course during the off season.

Six electric carts have been purchased and will be available for rental when the season opens; some 75 dead trees, most of them diseased elms, have been felled and cleared; and construction has started on new bridges at points where streams dissect the fairways.

Inside the clubhouse, expanded twice since the club opened in 1959, some frills are being added to pamper the members. A new shower for men is partly finished, while work on a sauna in the ladies' locker room is about to proceed. The distaff side will also have a row of beauty shoppe hair dryers.

In one corner of the clubhouse a former luncheon area is being converted into a card room.

The directors saved their best news to last — no increase in fees.

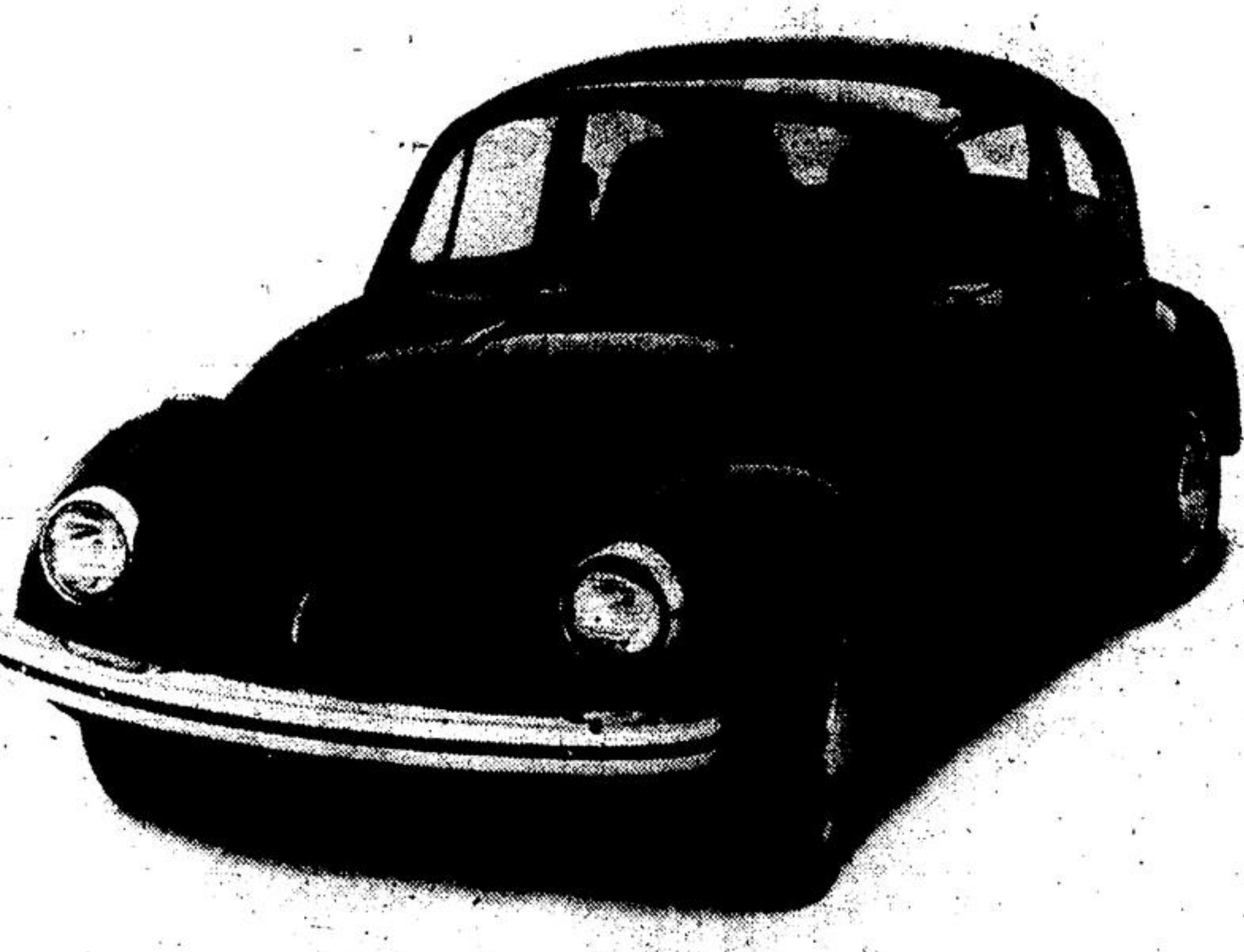
