Breeders View Prize Ont. Holstein Herds

Fifty Halton Holstein Breeders held a very successful bus trip last Thursday, visiting the farm of F. Roy Ormiston, of Brooklin, Ronald and Harry Harry Werry, Oshawa, T. Ronald Flett, Oshawa; W. J. McGresken, Black Water, and Robert Gibb, of Black Water.

The highlight of this trip was the visit to the Ormiston's 'Roybrook' Farm. Over 75 per cent of this herd are descendants of a foundation cow, Balsam Brae Pluto Sovereign, purchased by Mr. Ormiston in 1955. The tremendous size and uniformity of cattle in his herd impressed the visitors. Although Mr. Ormiston milks only twenty cows, his composite BCA in 1968 was 152.

Another feature of the trip were the daughters of Roybrook Telstar (lately exported to Japan) in the Werry and Flett herds. This bull was bred by Mr. Ormiston and is a direct descendant of the Balsam Brae cow. Excellent animals were also found in the McGresken and Gibb herds.

Link Huttonville Telephones With Toronto is Possibility

Direct dial, toll free, calls for Huttonville residents to Toronto are a distinct possibility by 1970 — if the majority of telephone users in the village signify their approval.

H. A. Blachford, manager of the Brampton exchange of Bell Canada, told Chinguacousy council Monday night his company is willing to add Huttonville to the Brampton calling area and provide service to all the extended areas offered Brampton and Bramalea residents on the 451 and 459 exchanges for implementation in 1970.

Deluge of Calls
Mr. Blachford said the decision by his company came after the local service office was deluged with calls following the announcement of Brampton's proposed service to Toronto.

He said Huttonville residents, now on 865 exchanges, would likely be switched to 452, 454 or 455 with the added direct dial areas.

Included for Huttonville residents would be the existing local call areas of Brampton, Georgetown, Snelgrove, Streetsville and Victoria, plus Toronto, Gore, Castlemore, Caledon East, Scarborough, Willowdale, Don

Mills, Weston, New Toronto, Islington, Clarkson, Port Credit, Malton, Cookville, Woodbridge, Thornhill, Agincourt, West Hill and all Metro-Toronto areas.

Cost Increase
Individual users in Huttonville now paying \$4.65 per month would have a rate rise, on approval of a rate hike by Bell, now in the hands of the Canadian Transport Commission, to \$5.20, and on extension of the local service to the areas listed above to \$7.15 monthly.

Two party lines would rise from \$3.65 to \$4.15 and \$5.55 and multi-party lines from \$3.25 to \$3.85 to \$4.90.

Huttonville residents now pay — for individual lines — 90 cents per month for each quarter-mile they live outside the base rate boundary of the village.

This would increase to 75 cents per quarter mile when the extended service started.

The Bell Company, which received approval of council last night for its proposals, will petition all Huttonville residents on the matter, and the majority vote will decide.
