Prosperous Here, But Willing To Help Others Says Whiting

Even a prosperous constituency such as Halton has its pockets of poverty which are of grave concern, Rud Whiting (L-Halton) said in the Commons Thursday.

Speaking during debate on the establishment of a new department of regional economic expansion, Whiting said his riding would not be directly involved with the department. But such pockets of poverty as do exist in Halton exist throughout the whole country and these should be of concern to the government.

He said the worst effect was in housing and he hoped the government would soon introduce new legislation on housing to alleviate this problem in Halton and throughout Canada.

"However, according to DBS figures, Halton is one of the more affluent areas of the country and I know the people of Halton will endorse any effort to upgrade the economic standards of those persons living in parts of Canada in need of assistance," Whiting said.

"We must recognize, however, that they will be sharing in the costs and together with the rest of Canada will be vitally interested in the success of any program or agreement which is put into effect."

The Halton MP said it would be valuable to have a detailed system of achievement evaluation so that if a project showed signs of success it could be encouraged and pushed. If it did not show reasonable progress, it could be scrapped and money would not be wasted in flogging a dead horse.

He warned that miracles could not be expected from the new department and the objectives would not be achieved overnight. Some of the proposed programs would take years to bear fruit and a large measure of patience, understanding, tact and diplomacy would be necessary.

Whiting noted that some regions in Canada had wage levels as much as 30 per cent below the national average and unemployment which at times doubles that of the more prosperous parts. Many previous attempts had been made to shore up the economy of various regions and millions of dollars had been spent under various plans and programs but few had achieved any worthwhile results.

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

If you have a choice of two finesses and you can only take one, which one should you take. The answer to this should be apparent from the rest of the cards. Which one will do you the most good if it wins or loses?

This interesting hand came up a few weeks ago at the Acton Bridge Club. East dealt with neither side vulnerable.

Opening lead - 5 of clubs.

Nobody was more surprised than South, to find himself in game with just one high card point in his hand. Both of North's doubles were for take out. The first time South did not have to bid since East kept the bidding open but the second he had to speak up.

Declarer had to win the opening lead in dummy. His plan was simple. Get the trump out of his hand if it fails? Let's look at diamonds first. If the finesse works, declarer will have to get to his hand to repeat the finesse. He could still lose two spades, a club and a trump. If the diamond finesse fails, he might set up an extra trick if the suit is evenly divided or if the ten falls.

If the spade finesse works and East has the ace, then declarer can ruff spades to take the diamond finesse. If the finesse fails then declarer can set up two spade tricks and discard two of his diamonds.

A successful diamond finesse will not let declarer try the spade finesse but a successful spade will still let declarer try the diamond finesse. Hence de-

clarer tried the spade and all worked out as predicted.

O.P.P. REPORT

Seven Charged as Crash Cost \$4450

During the week ending March 15 officers of the OPP attached to North Halton Detachment worked a total of 1,044 hours and patrolled 12,643 miles on area highways county and township roads. Ninety-nine persons were charged for various offences under the Highway Traffic Act, and an additional 72 received warnings for minor driving errors or for operating vehicles with faulty equipment. Proceedings in Provincial Judge's court led to 91 convictions being registered under the Highway Traffic Act, the Liquor Control Act, and the Criminal Code of Canada.

Twenty-three occurrences of a non traffic nature required investigation this week. Many were of a minor nature requiring little investigative time; in

addition, there were 4 theft investigations, 1 breaking and entering, 1 complaint of hunters, 1 dog complaint, 1 investigation of malicious damage, 1 prowler complaint, 1 assault, 2 premises found insecure, 1 stolen car recovered for another police department and the recovery of other stolen property led to charges under the Criminal Code being laid against 2 persons. One L.C.A. investigation led to 1 person being charged.

Ten motor vehicle accidents were reported during this 7 day period. Eight were property damage only and the remaining 2 resulted in injuries to 4 persons. One accident was a hit and run, while others were caused by careless driving; improper turn; unsafe movement from a parked position; and a dog was killed when it ran into the path of a car. Total property damage amounted to \$4,450. Seven charges were laid as a result of investigation into these accidents.
