CLERGY COMMENTS

HUMAN RELATIONS AND THE EASTER MESSAGE

Jesus did not die that we should remain the same. Our lives were in a turmoil and He came to give us peace. Our lives were broken, disunited, full of strife. He came to heal and unify our broken and fragmented lives. We were at enmity with each other, in constant conflict, but Jesus came to live and die that all this would be changed. He wants to change us from being a problem-centred crowd of individuals to a power-centred, closely knit group.

The cause of all this disturbance in our human relationships is sin; the sin of setting the self at the centre of life instead of God. When man displaces God and puts himself on the throne, he is not only estranged to God, but also to his fellow men, but the gift of the Cross and Easter to man is a totally new relationship of man to both God and to his fellow-men. It is, however, difficult for man to fully comprehend this doctrine of human-divine relationship. It cannot be learned apart from experience. John Calvin wrote—

"Doctrine is not an affair of the tongue, but of the life, is not apprehended by the intellect and memory merely, like other branches of learning; but is received only when it possesses the whole soul, and finds its seat and habitation in the inmost recesses of the heart."

When a man speaks of his church membership or speaks of his relationship to the symbol or image of Christianity, the Cross, and yet in his human contacts with others shows not the spirit and mind of Christ, but exalts the self, he has not yet received the whole gift of Easter nor the power of the Cross and Resurrection. Regardless of what a man may say he is, he who is the recipient of the Easter gift has — NEW LIFE — a new way of living — a new, mature spiritual relatedness to his fellows.

In the Christian community we ought to find group and individual tensions at a very minimum. Human relations in a Christian group ought to be better and healthier than in any other assembly of men. J. B. Phillips translation of Philippians 2:1-2 reads:

"Now if your experience of Christ's encouragement and love means anything to you, if you have known something of the fellowship of His spirit, and all that it means in kindness and deep sympathy . . . live together in harmony. Live together in love, as though you had only one mind and one spirit between you."

This should be the effect of Easter in the individual life, as he lives in the fellowship of others. The purpose in the whole drama of redemption was to bring harmony out of chaos; dissolve the tensions between God and man, and between men; dispel all conflict, selfishness; and create in the hearts of men the desire to live together, work together in a fellowship of love and respect for one another. So, at this Easter season, let us remember that in Christ's death and resurrection, is the power as well as the example of our dying to self, to live in and for a redemptive community, a new creation in Christ.

The scholarship was founded to honour J.B. West, who taught Latin and history in London for 36 years, then taught at Neuchatel until his death in 1962.
