

Raiders Leading Harvesters In Semi-Final Playoffs

Cheltenham's Harvesters reaped only defeat and frustration in weekend semi-final playoff encounters with Georgetown Raiders.

Raiders, who surrendered the opening game of the series to Cheltenham on their home ice in Bramalea Arena by a 3-2 score last week, rebounded here Friday night to crush Cheltenham 15-3. Sunday, Raiders took the series lead with a convincing 8-3 victory.

Frustrating for the Harvesters was the fact that they managed to score only once against Raider forward Jim Cole who was pressed into service between the pipes when regular goaltender Norm Lockhurst was ejected.

He was slapped with a match misconduct on top of a five minute major with more than three minutes left in the second period. Georgetown owned an 8-2 lead at the time and with the rearguard playing it tough in front of their stop-gap goalie Cheltenham didn't add to their total until late in the third period.

Because of the delay while Cole donned Lockhurst's armour the final three minutes of the second period were tacked on to the third.

Raiders pumped in the four first period goals, added five in the second and piled on six more in the third to make it a rout.

Paul Robinson led the Raiders with six goals, Jack Gudgeon fired three, Terry Lane two, and the rest came from Doug Richardson, Wayne Davison, Jim Cole and Don Norton.

Cheltenham's goal scorers were Mike Finnegan (2), and Junior Tibbets.

Two Harvesters T. Hubbard, and G. Keates involved in the second period eruption with Lockhurst were tagged with fighting majors and game and match misconducts respectively.

In all there were 14 penalties four to Raiders.

Sunday's clash was free of unscheduled bouts, but 19 penalties were shared about evenly.

Cheltenham stayed close until mid way through the second period when Raiders broke a 2-1 tussle wide up. The middle period ended 5-2, but Georgetown's momentum carried through in the third period when they outscored Harvesters 3-1.

Blake Inglis, Paul Robinson

and Doug Richardson each scored twice and Jack Gudgeon and Don Norton once for the winners. Ed Webster notched two and Gord Thompson one for Chelt.

Sunday's game saw Gerry Inglis return to the fray. The Raider player-coach has been strictly a bench general since mid-way through the quarter-final series with Ferguson.

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
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
