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Council Establishes Convention Policy

A maximum of three members of council will be able to attend any conventions, council decided Tuesday night. These conventions will be approved by council before anyone attends.

Oxfam Entries Now Available

Entry forms for the 1969 Oxfam "Miles for Millions" walk became available in Georgetown today. An Oxfam official told The Herald the forms had been placed in most of the schools and at the public library.
