Sentence Three Youths After Break-In, Theft

A 19 year old Georgetown youth was sentenced to two years nine months in Kingston Penitentiary for two separate break-ins in Georgetown and four charges of cashing stolen money orders and cheques when he appeared in county court this week.

Judge James R. Black sentenced two other Georgetown youths aged 20 and 21 to 12 months definite and 12 months indefinite for their part in the break-ins.

The three youths broke into Delrex Smoke Shop and sub post office in the Georgetown Market in January and stole several money orders.

The youngest of the three forged the money orders and cashed them in Brampton, Mississauga, and Toronto. The largest was for \$100.

The earlier break-in occurred in October at Murray's Esso Service station at the eastern entrance to town on Guelph Street.

Judge Black also fined a 17 year old Georgetown teen \$75 for stealing a car here last September.

The judge agreed with assistant Crown Attorney Murray Roulston and the boy's lawyer, William Sharpe of Milton, that the youth had spent the last three weeks in jail.

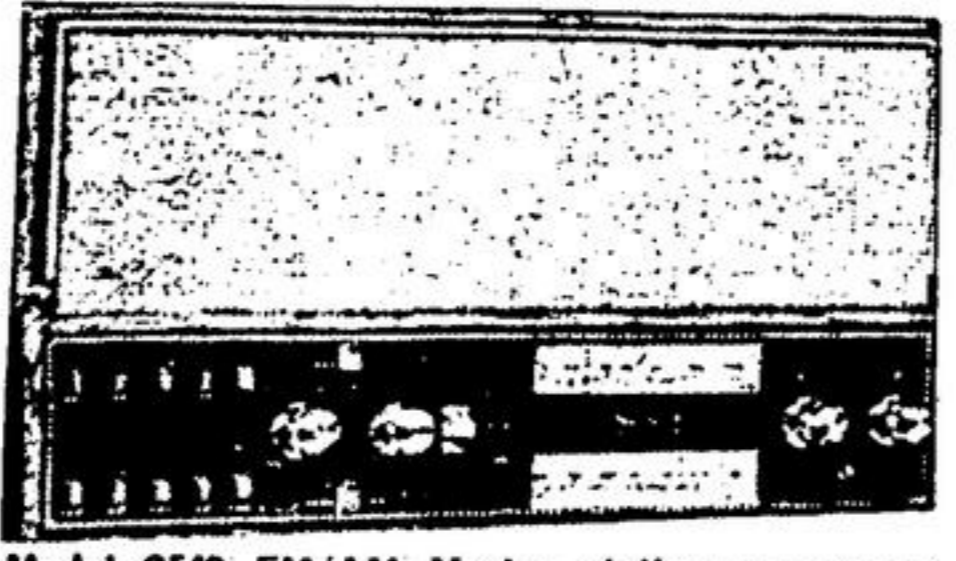

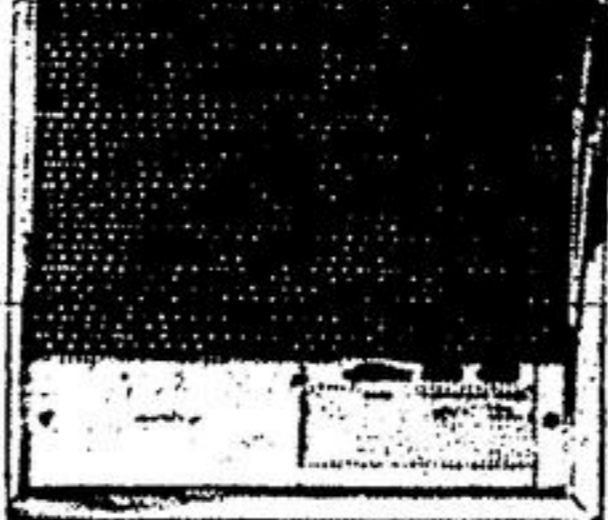

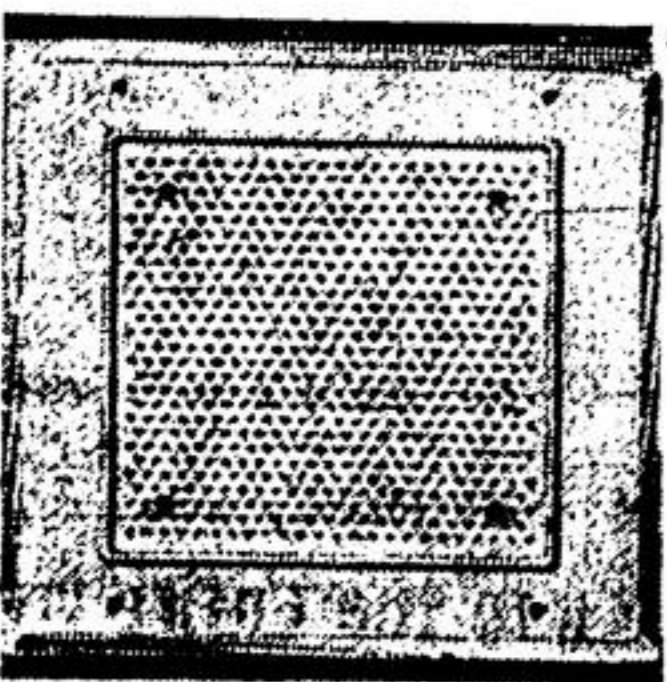
Model 2540 FM/AM Master station component in walnut finish.



Model 2550 — Wide range inside speaker



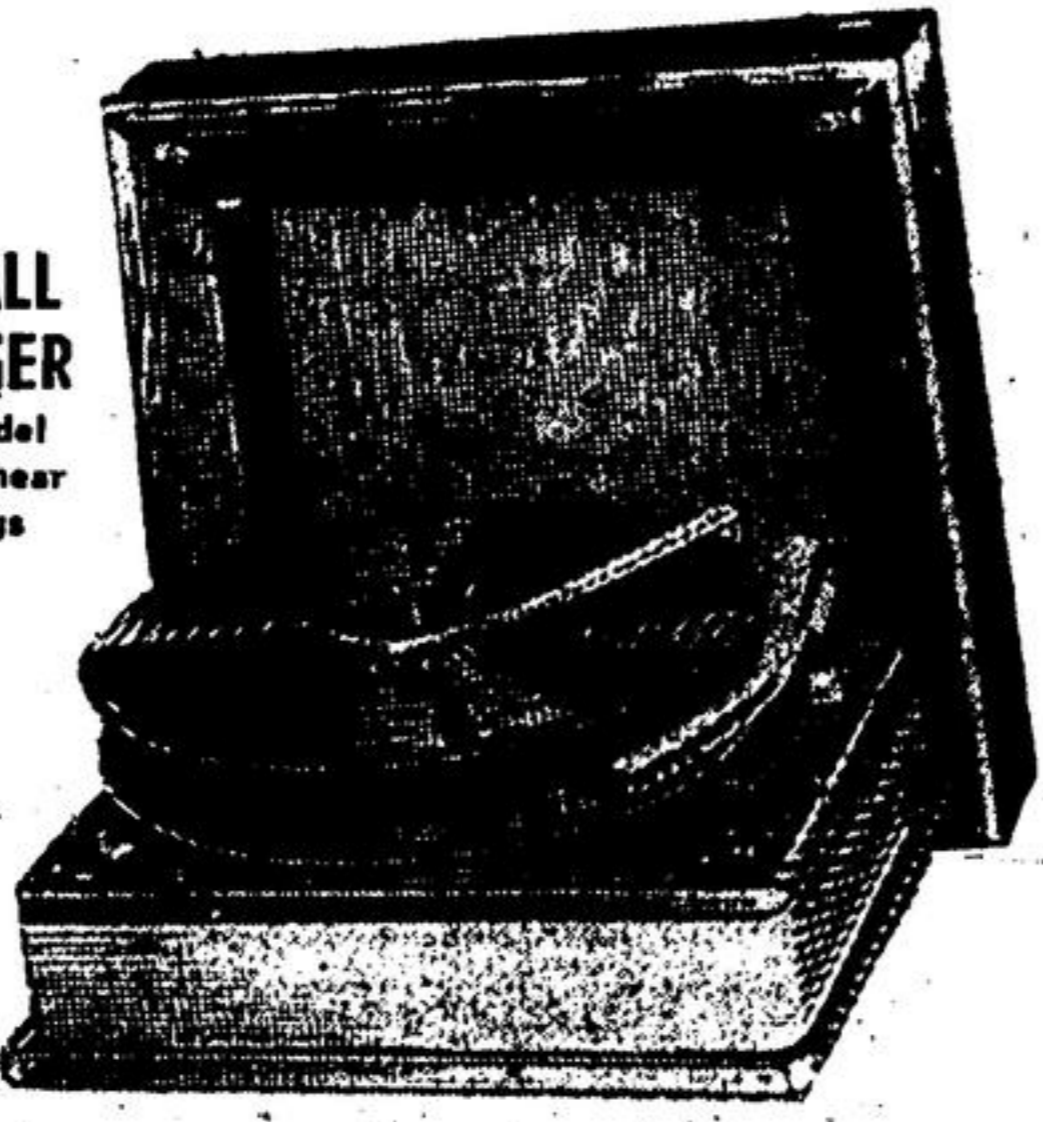
