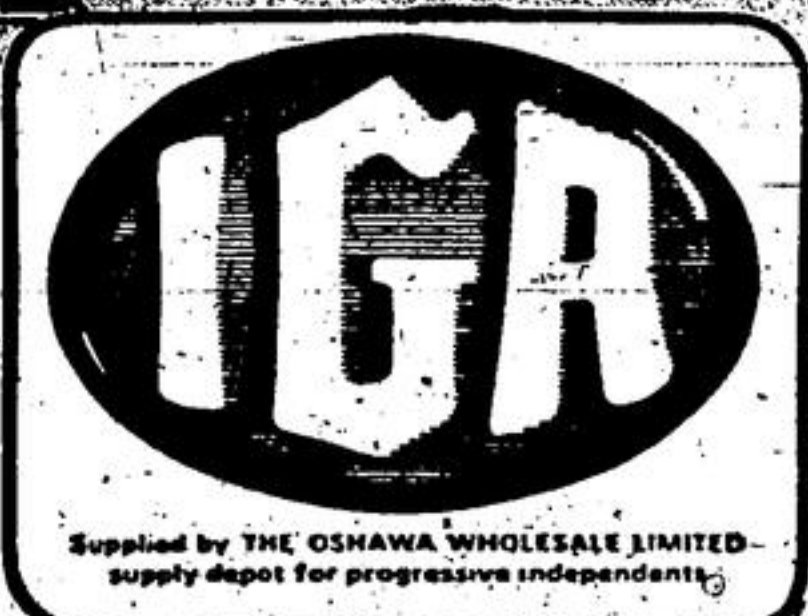

Bull Jerseys Awarded Merit Medal Honours

The Jersey bull, Brampton, Sir Bijou Radar, Excellent a Superior Sire and Gold and Silver Medal bull, has just been designated a Medal of Merit bull on the high production of his daughters, by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club. This bull was for several years in artificial insemination service and was used widely throughout Canada.

He was bred by B. H. Bull & Son, Norval, and used in the herd of Maurice C. Bealy Milton and finally in the Oxford and District Cattle Breeding Association, Woodstock.

He is a son of Brampton Radar, Excellent, a Gold and Silver Medal, and Medal of Merit, Superior and Century Sire, and his dam is Brampton W. R. Bijou, Excellent, a Silver Medal daughter of Brampton World's Records, with a record at three years of age, in 365 days, of

10400 lbs. milk, 625 lbs. fat, 6.10 per cent.

The Jersey bull, Brampton Pinn Girl's Radar 6N, Excellent, a Silver Medal bull, has been designated a Gold Medal Bull by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club. This bull was bred by B. H. Bull & Son, Norval, and was used in the herd of Hans Steingruber, East Farnham, Quebec.

He is a son of Brampton Radar, Excellent, a Medal of Merit Gold and Silver Medal, Superior and Century Sire, with

108 tested daughters that average 9,521 lbs. of milk; 527 lbs. fat, 5.53 per cent, and 123 classified 87.28 per cent. His dam is Brampton W. R. Pinn Girl, Excellent, with a Silver Medal, three Gold Medals and three Medals of Merit, 2 Ton of Gold certificates, and a Lifetime Production in 7 lactations of 98,404 lbs. milk, 5,944 lbs. fat.
