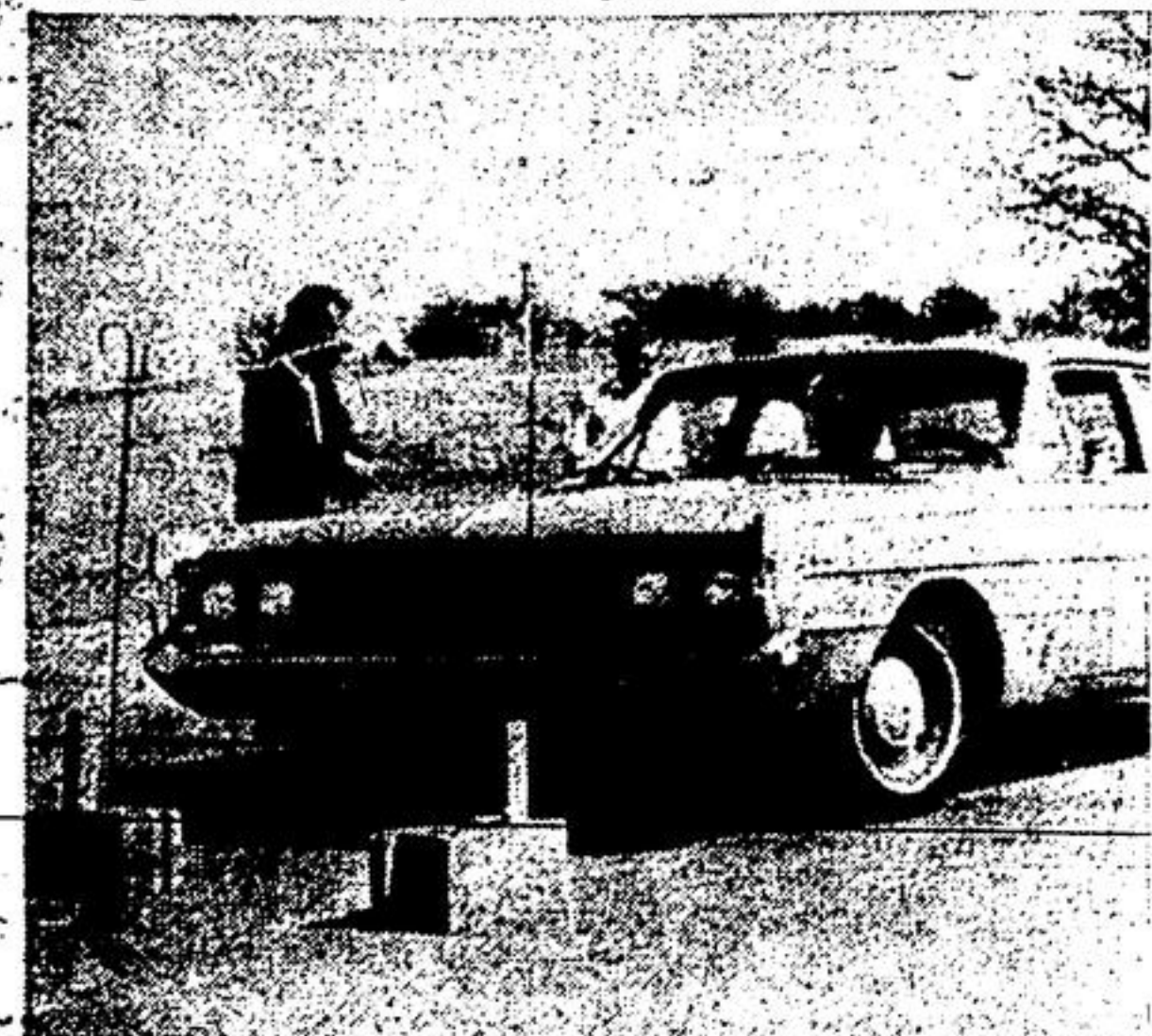
## Driving Skill Makes Paul Gibson Champion

## Talk by Mel Taylor On Witness Program

"Law and order will be established earthwide within this generation. While world leaders see a black future, with crime and violence, Christians have confidence in a far better future." So said John MacPherson, principal speaker at the circuit assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses in Burlington Friday. Many Georgetown residents were among the capacity gathering of 1,490.

According to Mr. MacPherson, whether people like to believe it or not, the lack of law and order in the world affects every one. "It touches us personally affecting our thinking and actions," he said. "Indications are that pressures on everyone will increase because lawlessness and disorder are increasing."

The speaker assured his audience that total law and order

will come only by government from heaven, God's kingdom rule.

"This is no 'pie in the sky' or wishful thinking, for it is just as real as the lawlessness surrounding us now. The law and order God will bring about earthwide will exceed the imagination of all of us today."

Mr. MacPherson's discourse was the highlight of the 3-day assembly. On Saturday 17 new ministers were ordained to the ministry.

Among those from Georgetown appearing on the convention program was Melville Taylor, presiding minister. He spoke to the assembly on the subject "Do not give yourselves up to rest."
