James said he was hopeful that the influx of new residents to Georgetown had included some ball players and extended an invitation to any harboring a notion to play with the local baseballers this season.

Daily outdoor workouts will start Sunday April 27 in the ball park and run for two weeks.

In a report tabled at a Georgetown Giants executive meeting last week, president Don Wilkes reporting on a Halton Baseball Association meeting, mentioned the league will be made up of nine teams this season. Campbellville has rejoined the loop after a year's absence while Milton has dropped out.

The Giants executive is still hopeful that the lighting system to be installed in Georgetown park will be in operation for play this year.

The Giants' first fund raising project, a stag nite in the armoury, was held Friday night and was successful.

## Fire Departments Prizewinners Are Honoured at Dinner-Dance

Oakville and Milton Fire departments and the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau were lauded for outstanding 1968 fire prevention programs on Saturday, during the annual dinner and dance of the Halton Mutual Aid organization, held in Milton Fire Hall.

All three groups were named prizewinners in the 1968 scrapbook competition sponsored by the National Fire Protection Association. There were 284 Canadian communities and 224 from the United States in the 42nd annual NFPA contest last year.

Oakville Fire Department was first in Ontario and first in Canada for municipalities with 25,000 to 100,000 population, and also came fifth when all Canadian municipal entries were scored regardless of population. George Alexander, Chief of the Fire Services Division of the Ontario Fire Marshal's office, presented a plaque, a shield and a certificate to Oakville Councillor Don Gordon and Fire Chief J. Douglas Wilson.

Halton Fire Prevention Bureau received a "special recognition" certificate for an outstanding county-wide campaign against fire. Two other bureaus in Renfrew and Leeds-Grenville counties were awarded similar certificates. Mr. Alexander presented the award to Halton Warden George Currie and Bureau chairman Chief Jack Cunningham of Georgetown.

Third local prizewinner was the Milton Fire Brigade, whose scrapbook account of 1968 fire prevention activities earned an

"honourable mention" in the Ontario competition for towns of 5,000 to 10,000 population.

Other officials on hand for the presentation included Halton East MPP James W. Snow, William O'Sullivan of the Ontario Fire Marshal's Office, Mayors Brian Best of Milton, Wheldon Emmerson of Georgetown and Les Duby of Acton, and Reeve William Hoey of Nassagaweya.

Sherwood Hume, vice chairman of Halton Mutual Aid chaired the dinner. About 80 enjoyed the roast beef dinner served by Milton Fire Brigade Ladies Auxiliary, and the dance which followed.

## Judge Critical of Law Refuse Guilty Pleas

Provincial Judge Kenneth Langdon refused to accept guilty pleas from three 17 year old Georgetown youths Monday because he said he was concerned that convictions on theft charges would give them a lifetime criminal record.

The judge told the three he would remand them for a week. He said he would need that time to determine their guilt or innocence and ordered them to continue their Grade 12 studies behind bars.

Counsel for the youths, said he could offer no reasonable explanation for the offence which involved theft of \$7 and soft drinks from a clubhouse. He said none of the boys had a previous record.

Judge Langdon criticized Ontario law which treats youths as adults at age 16 and called for a uniform juvenile age throughout Canada.

He said if the three Georgetown youths had been charged in British Columbia or Quebec, they would have been charged as juveniles and whether found guilty or not guilty would not acquire a criminal record.

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
