Veto Liberal Request For Town Statistics

'No politics in municipal affairs' was the decision Monday when council received a request from the Ontario Liberal party to provide information to be used in a planned 'no confidence vote' in the legislature. The Liberals plan to challenge the government on education costs.

Cr. Ern Hyde led the opposition, which found Reeve Hunter, Crs. Denison and Morrow siding with him. As Mayor Emerson was not present, the vote was 4-4 on a motion to provide the information, and was ruled out.

The Conservative government did not emerge unscathed however. 'I'll openly criticize education minister Davis,' said Mr. Hyde, 'but we should take our criticism to the government, not let party politics enter local affairs.'

Reeve Hunter said he was of the same opinion. 'I would have voted for this if it had come from the parliament buildings,' he said. 'We certainly need someone to talk to Mr. Davis on education.'

Cr. Bill Smith argued that anything council can do to cut education costs should be done, and he could see nothing partisan in providing information. Cr. Harry Levy backed him up. Cr. Donna Denison remarked that the role of the opposition is an integral part of a party system.
