Play school children were led by Mrs. Pam Soward and Mrs. Eileen Motter who entertained with songs, games and crafts.

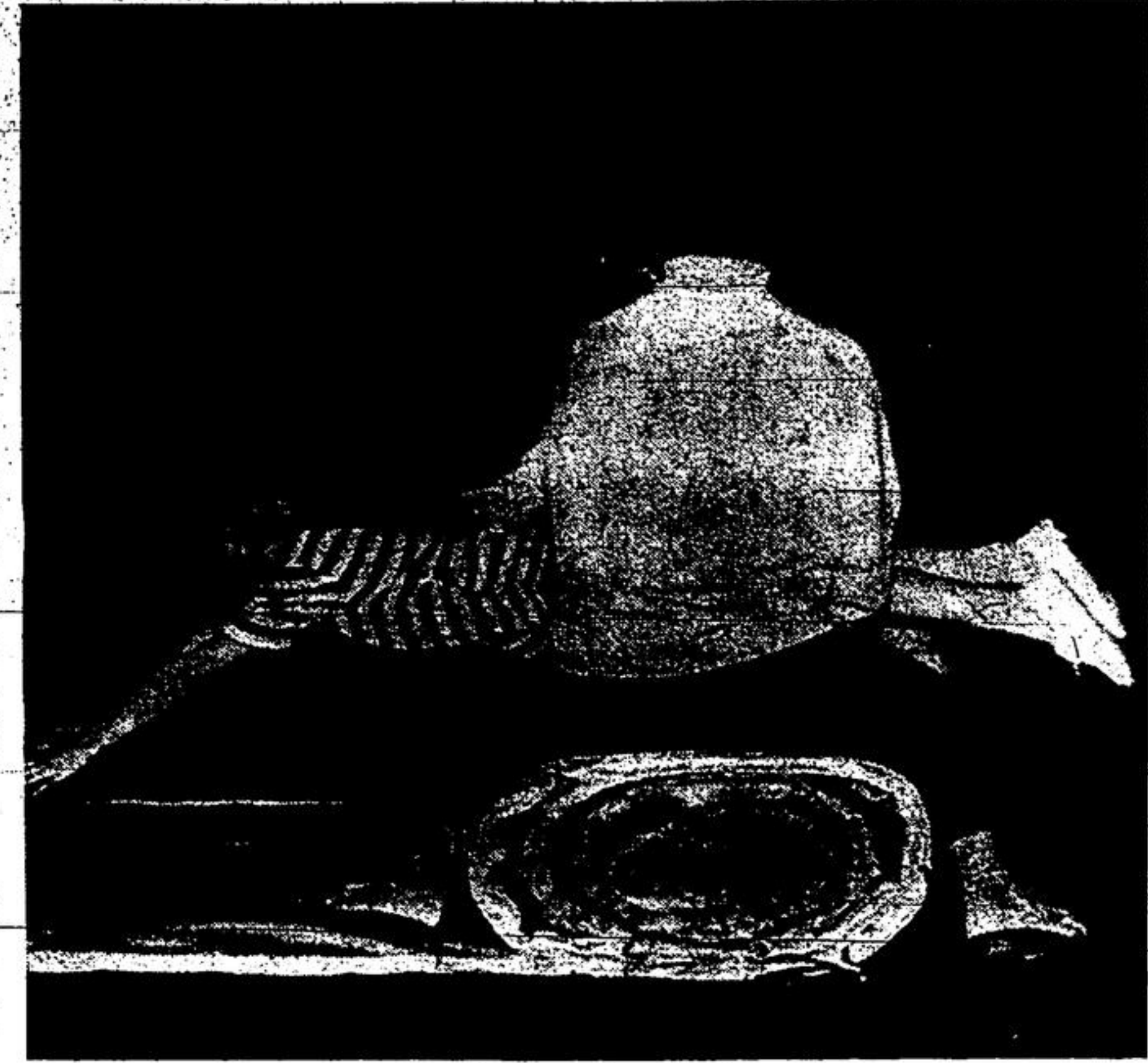

Judo was next on the agenda and as usual a most impressive

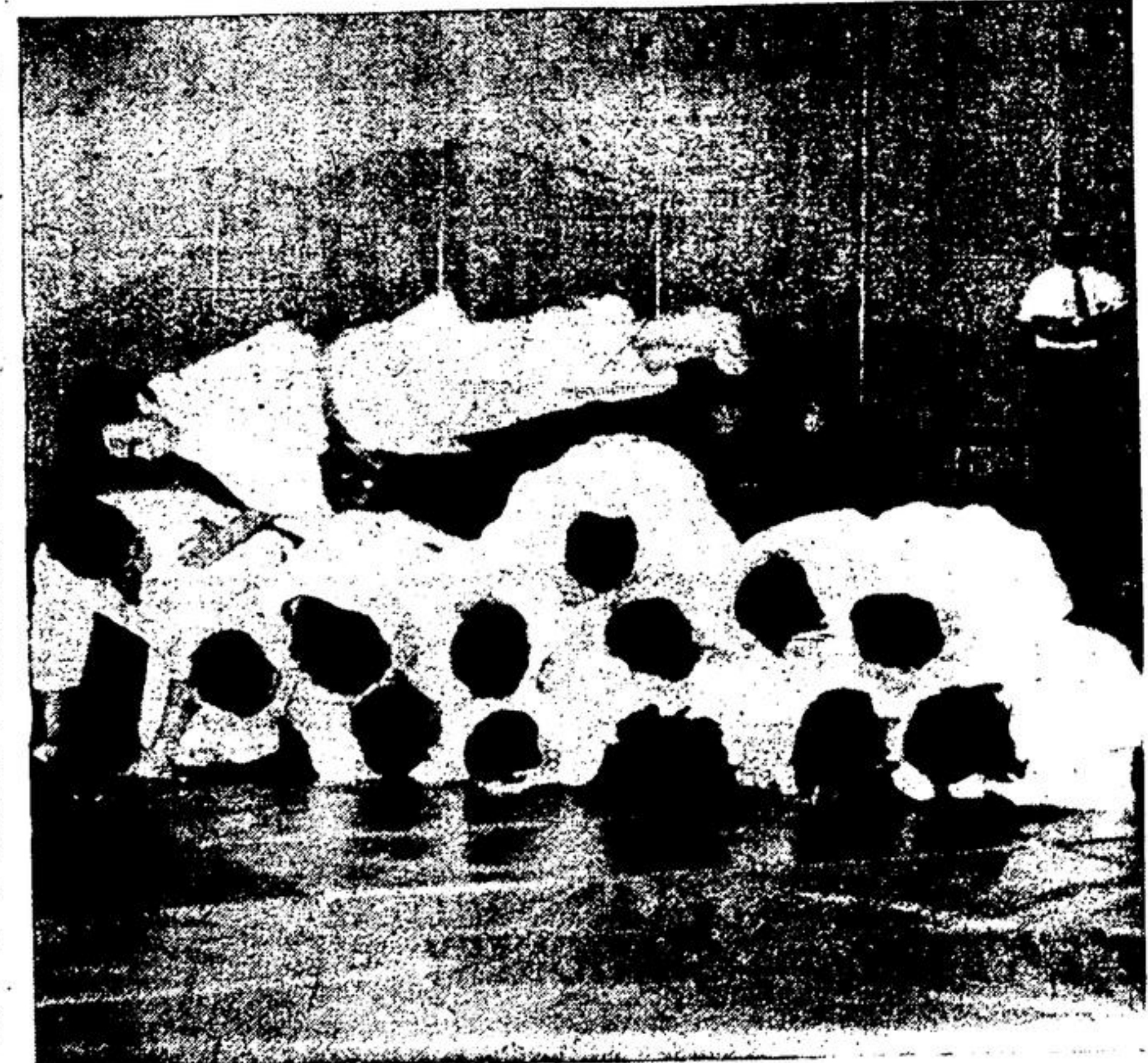

The cafeteria was another centre of attention. Coffee and refreshments were served here amid displays, and an information table was well frequented by interested visitors.

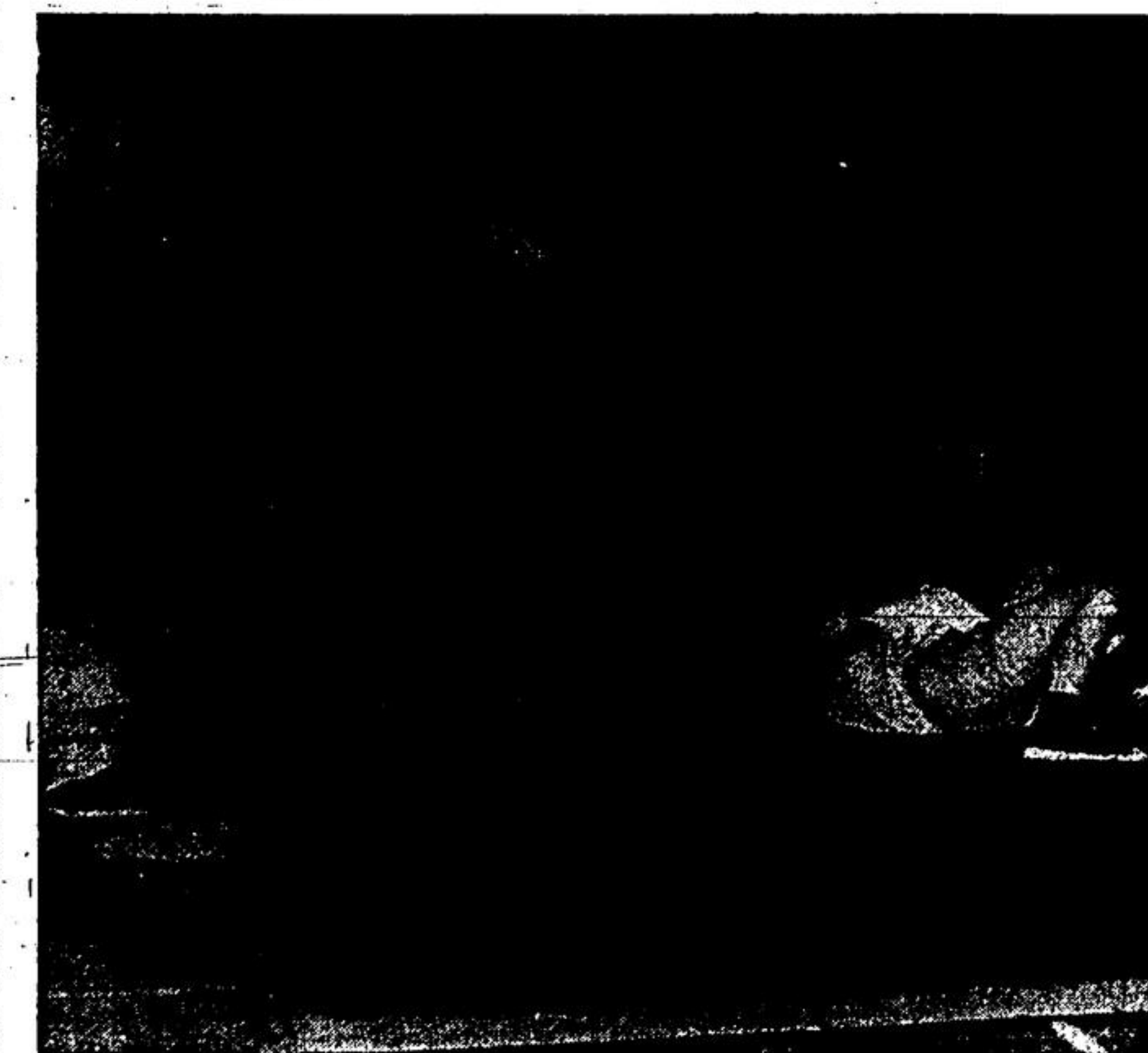
The World Service committee presented a film on the works of the Y around the world, and a presentation of Y pins was made to the leaders by the Georgetown president Mrs. Mildred Ford.

Shift School Boundaries Some Go To Stewarttown

For the first time Georgetown elementary school students will go outside the town limits to attend school in September.

With the new Halton County Board of Education set-up and the eradication of individual school boards, the county board has decided it is more economical to shift the boundaries.

Present Grades 6 and 7 students in Park and Chapel Street schools, will enrol in grades 7 and 8 at Stewarttown Senior School.

While present grades 6 and 7 students in Wrigglesworth school, will enrol in grades 7 and 8 at Centennial school.

To avoid duplication in transportation routes, some buses will carry both elementary and high school students.

Moore Park children, who have been attending Park or Chapel Street school, (other than those who will be entering Grades 7 and 8) will continue to do so. The few Moore Park students who have been attending Wrigglesworth will go to Chapel Street, which will have space with the removal of Grades 7 and 8. This should be good news for the Moore Park families whose children have gone to different schools. Now all children from kindergarten to Grade 6 from one family will attend the same school. Kindergarten children starting in September will attend the same school as their older brothers and sisters, either at Chapel or Park schools.
