Family Life and Christianity

Throughout history the human family has been accepted as the foundation of society. It is in the 'unit' of the family that cultural ways and values are developed and changed, and through these ways and values children grow to adulthood. Because the family has the ability to change it is capable of functioning in primitive life, in the Middle Ages and in the new biological age.

The family is, in a sense, a living organism. As such it is subject to influences which may damage it or cause it to be emotionally sick. Damage to the stability of family life in the past has been physical in nature. The family has been threatened by famine, poverty, war and governmental systems. For the North American family these threats have, to a great extent, been overcome. However, we are not so comfortable emotionally or morally. We see danger signals in the rising divorce rate, common-law unions, the steady rise in drug addiction, school dropouts, etc.

There are certain stabilizing forces which run as a thread through the ages binding together the nomadic family of Abraham's time as securely as the family of the jumbo-jet age. One of these forces is love — unselfish, sustaining love. For the Christian this is based on God's love for us and ours for Him. Because of this divine love we learn to extend love in our families, communities, world.

There are many ways in which love can manifest itself in the family, two of which are: communication between husband and wife and communication between parents and children. The Christian husband and wife are bound by marriage vows to love and cherish one another in sickness and in health. The church talks about marriage being a mystical union because no one knows the physical, emotional and spiritual levels of a person as does that person's life partner. No one is fully aware of himself on these levels until marriage. In this way marriage is a mystical union. Marriage on the spiritual level demands that each partner shares all through a mutual confidence; all ideas, plans, expressions, needs, doubts, sorrows, regrets, dreams and disappointments. Marriage in this spirit leads thru a mutual give and take, through an ever deepening knowledge of one another, to bring both closer together as one before God.

Young people today are suffering from a scarcity of examples of mature men and women who practice what they preach. They are impatient of the intolerance and mistrust that lie behind attempts to restrict their freedom in making moral choices. The young person wants to be like some adult he sees and admires because he is looking for an adult image for himself. This is an age in which the parent is too inclined to delegate responsibility to others. 'Let some one else do it' is the thought if not the word. For example, the average parent is scared to talk about sexual matters with the adolescent, hoping that he will find out in men's. Marriage in the spirit leads thru a mutual give and offspring should preach and practise that rights and responsibility go along together. The Christian parents have, and must use, the ability to help the family mature physically, intellectually, emotionally and spiritually.
